

Wind Deprives Hurdler Of National Prep Marks

Cawley Big Star At Relays

Paces Farmington To Class A Win.

MT. PLEASANT—Four times a gusty wind deprived remarkable Warren Cawley from establishing national high school hurdle records here yesterday, so the star Farmington performer had to be satisfied with leading his team to the Central Michigan Relays Class A team championship.

Cawley undercut national high school records in the 120-yard high hurdles and 180-yard low hurdles both in preliminaries and finals, but a wind of from eight to 11 miles an hour ruled out any chance that the marks could be submitted for recognition.

He ran the high hurdles in 13.75 seconds in the finals after a 13.8 clocking in the preliminaries, and posted an 18.25 seconds time in the low hurdle finals after an 18.4 preliminary heat.

The national record in the high hurdles is 13.9 and in the low hurdles, 18.5.

Cawley also tied for first in the high jump and ran a leg on a winning Farmington relay team to total 15½ points. Farmington won with 47 points.

Birmingham was second, mostly because of a disqualification in the 880-yard relay, with 44 points, followed by Lansing Sexton with 43. Walled Lake was fourth with 31½ points and Traverse City finished fifth with 30.

Birmingham led during most of the meet and was a clinch for the title until judges ruled that a Birmingham runner had slipped out of his lane. A disqualification cost the Maples four points and the team trophy.

Mt. Pleasant, only Saginaw area team competing in the Class A section of the meet, finished 10th with 16½ points.

Bill Rhodes was the outstanding individual star for Mt. Pleasant, taking a third place in the 120-yard high hurdles and fifth in the 180-yard low hurdles. Bob Mumford was part of the five-way tie for first place in the high jump, and Dan Paulin was part of a two-way tie for fifth in the pole vault for other Mt. Pleasant points.

The Oilers also gained points in two relays, taking fourth in the Central Relay and tying with Redford Union for third in the Shuttle Hurdle Relay.

Relay records that were broken were limited to the longer running events because of the wind.

Farmington's winning Central Relay team, which featured the running of Cawley, set a record of 1:07.75 to break the mark of 1:07.85 set by Saginaw High in 1954.

Jerry Bashow of Lincoln Park lowered his own record in winning the mile in 4:31.7. He ran the distance in 4:33.4 last spring.

Other marks were set by the Inkster Mile Relay team and Bill Alcorn of Birmingham in the pole vault. Alcorn sailed over the bar at 12-foot, 9½-inches to break the record of 12-foot, 7½-inches set by Dick Cahill of Muskegon in 1958.

The Greyhounds won two of the other three firsts, Jerry Knoll taking the 440 in 57.7 seconds and Ray Kinney the 880. St. James' only first was scored by Terry McPeak with a 9-6 jump in the pole vault.

Cranbrook Class B Titlist

Strength In Relays Brings Victory

MT. PLEASANT—Cranbrook concentrated its strength in relay events and the strategy paid off with the school's first title in one of the closest Class B Central Michigan College Relays meets here yesterday.

Cranbrook scored all but five of its points in the relays, setting one of seven new records, to take the title away from two other Detroit area schools, River Rouge and Willow Run.

THE WINNING total was 41 points, with River Rouge and Willow Run tying for second, each with 36. Lansing Everett was fourth with 30 points, followed by Flint Bendle with 25.

Only three Saginaw area teams were able to score points in the meet, and the area teams did not take one first place.

CASS CITY scored in four of the relay events and Fred Leeson took second in the pole vault to give the Red Hawks 24 points, good for sixth place. Leeson's vault of 11-feet, 9-inches was the best by an area athlete this season.

Alma took fourth in both the Two-Mile and Mile relays for eight points and part of a four-way tie for 12th.

Vassar's Bob Klopff threw the shot 47-feet, 10½-inches to take second in that event and give his team four points, good for part of a four-way tie for 22nd. Klopff's distance was the best by an area athlete this season.

CASS CITY took third places in the Central Relay and the 440-yard Relay, fourth places in the Middle Distance Relay and the 880-yard relay.
