

Boys' Prelims Follow at Dort Field

Girls' Track Meet Wednesday

Kearsley and Swartz Creek are the targets Wednesday at Dort Field in the annual girls track meet of the Genesee County League.

The meet, which starts at 2 P. M., begins a heavy day of activity at Dort.

At 4:30 the boys move in to run preliminaries in four events for Friday's finals. The Class C high jump final also will be completed.

Kearsley has earned its "team to beat" label in Class B by winning eight straight girls' titles. It scored 44 points last year for an 8½-point margin over Bendle.

Swartz Creek has become the girls' power by winning three of the last four titles. But last year the margin was a thin 33-32 over 1957 champion Ather-ton.

Competition will be held in six individual events and two relays.

Individual events are the running broad jump, standing broad jump, hop, step and jump, softball throw, shot put and 75-yard dash. Relays include the 200 and 440-yard events.

All schools are expected to field teams. Last year four Class B teams, Flushing, Fenton, Lakeville and Clio, and

Class C Montrose failed to score.

Kearsley has all but two girls who placed last year and owns six of the eight records.

Swartz Creek also has a strong contender again this year although it lost several key performers from 1958.

Swartz Creek, which placed fourth in Class C last year, is expected to get the jump on Dye by winning the high jump. Walt Henry, who was third in the State meet last Saturday, is the best Flintarea high jumper in Class C.

The Class B prelims Wednesday will go a long way toward
