

Eastern Ace Beats 25-Year-Old Mark

 This should be the best year ever in Public School League track and field. Three records already have been broken and another tied with more likely to fall by the time the team and individual championships are decided at Pershing High a week from today.

Henry Carr, of Southwestern, equaled the record of 21.7 seconds for the 220-yard dash in the West Side trials Tuesday, while new marks in the high jump, medley and sprint relays were set at the East Side finals yesterday.

Eastern's all-around star, Felton Rogers, shattered a 25-year-old record when he cleared the high jump bar at 6 feet 6, wiping out the 6-foot, 4 3/4-inch performance of Bernard Lucas, another Eastern athlete, in 1934.

The other marks were made by the Pershing and Mumford relays. The Pershing medley team of Darvin Wasson, Don Davis, Fred Turnipseed and Willie Marsh caught Mumford on the tape, winning in 2:27.9 against the former time of 2:28.9 made by Northern in 1955.

Mumford, only a tenth of a second behind in the medley, gained revenge by beating Pershing's sprint relay team in 1:29.3, bettering the record of 1:30.1 that Pershing set two years ago. The Mumford quartet was composed of Homer Heard, Jim Hampton, Dave Shevitz and Ken Burnley.

Another sparkling performance was turned in by Jerry Burrell, of Northern, who leaped 22 feet, 9 3/4 inches in the broad jump. His effort was 1 3/4

inches short of the record of 22 feet, 11 1/2 inches made by Cliff Robinson, of Northwestern, in 1924.

The 18-year-old Rogers was the meet's outstanding contestant. Besides his record-breaking high jump, the Eastern senior also won the 120-yard high hurdles in :15.3 and the 180-yard lows in :19.7, beating favored Lonnie Sanders, of Pershing, in both.

In addition, Felton anchored Eastern's third-place sprint relay for a total of 31 1/2 points. Points in all events are counted on the basis of 10-8-6-4-2-1.

Mumford outdistanced all other schools for the team title, scoring 116 points. Eastern was the runner-up with 82 1/2 and third-place Pershing had 77. Others to score were: Central 38; Northern 26; Northeastern 23 1/2; Cass 18 1/2; Denby 17; Osborn 4.

Cooley Trailing 2 in Baseball Race

Cooley needs a victory over Northwestern tomorrow if it is to have a chance for a fourth straight Public School League baseball title.

A 4-4 tie in eight innings with Southwestern yesterday left the defending champions in third place on the west side behind Western and Northwestern.

Western finished its league play by defeating Cody, 5-3, and has clinched a playoff berth, having won six games, lost one and tied one. Northwestern, idle yesterday, has a 6-1 record, while Cooley has five victories, a loss and a tie. Another tie or defeat tomorrow would eliminate Cooley from the playoffs. The first two

teams in each division qualifies for the playoffs.

Behind, 4-1, Southwestern scored three runs in the seventh inning on an error and three singles. Martinez Felder held Cooley to two hits, hit a batter, walked three and fanned five.

Art Cabadas, of Western, and Walt Bugajski, of Cody, waged a tight duel, each yielding four hits. Cabadas walked four and had five strikeouts. The Cody hurler gave up six walks and retired 10 on strikes.

A fourth-inning home run by Bob Colyer enabled Redford to defeat Chadsey, 6-5. Larry Rood gave up one hit and struck out four in three innings of relief for Redford.

Chuck Keller was responsible for eight runs with a four-run homer, two triples and a double as Southwestern whipped Denby, 10-6. Ed Krass connected for a home run with one on as Mumford beat Northwestern, 7-5.

Don Modrycki's four hits, including a double, accounted for four runs, Pershing beating Northeastern, 5-2. Central defeated Osborn, 9-4, on Odie Wollen's four-hit pitching.

Big Julie Hurt

Though the hockey season is more than four months away, the Red Wings already have an injury problem. Carter Wins in N.Y.

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Detroit's Ed Lubanski and Lou Campi, the pre-tournament favorites, both were eliminated in the qualifying matches, although Lubanski forced Hennessey into a special one-game rolloff for the fourth and last finals berth.

 Hennessey shot 200 even. Lubanski didn't finish the game after it became apparent he couldn't catch Hennessey. The Detroitier had 142 in the eighth frame and a spare working in the ninth, but it wasn't enough.

Although he bowled well (averaging 215) in his two evening assignments against Carter and Hennessey, the Pfeiffer team captain was unable to overcome a distressing afternoon in which he split six games and averaged only 184.

His low scores were particularly damaging because of the

unique scoring system used here. Under the system, a bowler was given an additional 10 per cent of his total for winning a game with a point being added for each 100 pins knocked down.

Thus while Bluth and the others were getting big bonuses for 200-plus games, Lubanski suffered on 180 and 190-game triumphs.

BONUS POINTS
 Carter whipped Bluth in their title match by stringing games of 202-192-185-229 to Bluth's 189-189-226-210. The pin bonuses gave Carter 8.77 points and Bluth 8.57. Bluth had led by nine pins entering the last game.

In the battle for third place, Hennessey belted Welu in their two-game test with games of 256-237 to Welu's 212-225. This gave Hennessey 5.43 points to Welu's 4.37.



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
