## Notre Dame Blanks U-D in Tourney

SOUTH BEND, Ind., May 29. —(AP)—The University of Detroit and Western Michigan were to meet today with the loser bowing out of the NCAA District 4 baseball tournament.

U. of D. chose to hold out its best pitcher yesterday and took a 10-0 trouncing from Notre Dame. Minnesota, the Big Ten champion, defeated Western Michigan, 6-4.

Sophomore Gary Mettie, the No. 1 U. of D. pitcher, wasn't ready yesterday because he had pitched Monday as the Titans took an anticlimactic game from Wayne State. He was to pitch today against Western, however, in an effort to keep the Titans in the running.

Notre Dame got to starter Ed Drabczyk fast, scoring five runs on five hits and five walks in the first three innings. It also blasted relievers Jim Debevec and Tom Kramer, while sophomore Nick Palihnich went all the way and yielded four hits while striking out 11.

First baseman Roney Klemens led the Titans' feeble attack with three singles. Only once, in the seventh inning, did a U. of D. player reach third base.

Minnesota pitcher Fred Bruckbauer gave up 11 hits, but Western Michigan left 12 men stranded.

## 2-Stroke Lead Taken by Goalby

LOUISVILLE, Ky., May 29. —(AP)—Bob Goalby says his putter has been working better for him in recent weeks, and his performances bear out the statement.

Goalby used only 24 putts yesterday in shooting a 31-33—64 for a two-stroke first-round lead in the Kentucky Derby Open. It broke the Derby Open record of 65 set in 1957 by Julius Boros.

Ernie Vossler finished with 34-32—66 for second place. Seven players were bunched at 69. Frank Belay, Leo Biagetti, Fred Hawkins, Bob Wolfe, Stan Hobert, Buddy Sullivan and Doug Ford.

Carr also ran the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat and had a winning leap of 22 feet 6½ inches in the broad jump. He finished the afternoon by making up a 15-yard deficit to give Southwestern first place in a heat of the half-mile relay. It was worth fourth on time. That gave him 31 points for the day.

Carr's display dimmed the performances of two other athletes. Jim Davis, of Western, led in the high and low hurdles and placed second in the high jump for 28 points, Talt Malone, of Northwestern, won the high jump, was second in the 100 and 220 and anchored his school's winning relay for 28½ points.

Six places score points on the basis of 10-8-6-4-2-1.

Redford ran away with its second successive West Side team title, scoring 128 5-7 points. The defending champions had five firsts, three seconds and a tie and five thirds. They placed in all events except the 220-yard dash.

Southwestern, the runner-up, had 63 17-28 points and Northwestern was third with 61. Mackenzie had 40 3-7; Western 36 5-28; Chadsey 35; Cody 27 3-7; Cooley 9; and Ford 3-7 of a point.
