

Redford Still Track King

Redford High, flashing its usual monopoly in the distance events, scored a resounding second straight Metropolitan League West Side track title yesterday at Mackenzie High.

Coach Bruce Waha's Huskies scored a total of 127 2-7 points, 25 of them coming in the half-mile alone. Runnerup Southwestern which boasted the only scored a total of 128 2-7 points, to third place Northwestern's 40 3-7.

Western was next with 36 5-28, followed by Chadsey with 35, Cody with 27 3-7, Cooley with 9 and Henry Ford with 3-7.

REDFORD THUS joins Mumford, which won the East Side title Wednesday, as City team champs.

The place winners from each division will compete next week for City individual titles, with the semifinals taking place on Tuesday and the finals on Thursday.

Redford scored in 11 of the 13 events, and turned the meet into a rout in the half-mile with its 25 points. Gary Chapin took first, Hank Lenox grabbed second, Mike McMillan was

third and Jim Murray sixth to account for the 25.

Southwestern's Henry Carr set the only record when the 16-year-old sophomore ran the 220-yard dash in 21.2 seconds, beating the existing mark by a half-second.

CARR'S TIME, against a headwind, is also two-tenths of a second faster than the state record.

Carr was a triple winner yesterday, taking in addition the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds flat and winning the broad jump with a leap of 22 feet, 6 1/2 inches.

Redford took five firsts all told. Besides the half-mile, the Huskies' Terry Moore won the mile in 4:30.1, fastest time this spring in the league, Carl Geistler copped the pole vault and Art Cranston won the shot put.

In addition, Redford's medley relay squad won its event.
