Lapeer '9' Is Upset in Tri-County

After two years of utter frustration, tiny L'Anse Creuse finally has made a winning impression on a Tri-County League opponent.

Where the school's football, basketball and track teams failed, the baseball squad succeeded yesterday. It was L'Anse Creuse's first Tri-County triumph in 18 tries.

Coach John Antico's baseball team nipped league-leading Lapeer, 2-1, with a last-inning rally.

After two men had been retired, L'Anse Creuse was the benefactor of three straight singles by Tom Timph, Stuart Reid and Bill Phillips.

Ron Skrocki, who had taken over the pitching duties for L'Anse Creuse in the sixth inning, received credit for the triumph.

A bases-loaded single by Doug Sulton produced both runs as South Lake edged Lake Shore, 2-1, in a Bi-County League contest. Tom Henretta started on the mound for South Lake, but Dave Cheek won in relief.

Another relief pitcher, Darryl Thorpe, paced Avondale to a 5-1 conquest of Troy in the Oakland B League. He held Troy to just three hits while collecting two himself.

Jerry Markowicz scattered six hits as Hamtramck outlasted Willow Run, 6-4.

Farmington's Warren Cawley, the state high and low hurdles champion bettered state record times in both the 100 and 220-yard dashes yesterday as his team crushed Walled Lake, 62½ to 46½, in an Inter-Lakes League dual track meet.

Cawley ran the 100 in 10.2 seconds and the 220 in 21.2. In addition, he won the high-jump with a leap of 5 feet,

19 points in the late spree. Carney, who previously had won the 100-yard dash, started the rally by taking the 220 and teammate John Gaul placed third.

Then sophomores John Powers and Tom Rodeheffer ran one-two in the mile and finally U. of D., anchored by Carney, wrapped up the half-mile relay.

Northern nipped Cass, 56½ to 52½, by winning the final half-mile relay. Ernie Hardman won the 100 and 220 for the losers, who took seven events to Northern's six.

Members of the decisive relay were Jerry Burrell, who also topped the broad jump; Sam Black, low and high hurdles winner; John Styles, runner-up in the 440, and Jim Massey, the 440 winner. Northern also took the medley relay.

Lonnie Sanders was a four-event winner as Pershing crushed Southeastern, 90-19. He led in both hurdle races, the 100-yard dash and broad jump.

Dave Shevitz ran the 100-yard dash in 9.9 seconds, won the 180-yard low hurdles and was on the winning sprint relay, Mumford trouncing Denby, 80½ to 28½. Willie Arnold won the 440, tied for first in the broad jump and ran a relay leg.
