Prep Fireballers Turn In 5 of 'Em

No-hitters are getting to be a habit with Austin Catholic southpaw Tom Wright. He pitched one of five Friday.

Wright blanked Salesian, 1-0, for his second hitless performance in four days. He beat Cathedral Central, 1-0, Tuesday.

CERALD NOSEWSKI, a sophomore, also threw a no-hitter, but ended up as the losing pitcher in St. Alphonsus' 1-0 triumph over St. Hedwig. Three walks and an infield out accounted for the run.

Roger Rygiel, the winning pitcher, lost his bid for a no-hitter in the seventh inning when Joe Kovulich beat out an infield single.

St. Francis Xavier scored enough runs to go with Ron Gretka's no-hitter, defeating St. Agatha, 11-0. Catcher Bob Cummings and Pete Smith each blasted three-run homers.

Larry Rose, who has pitched two two-hitters, blanked River Rouge without a hit while hurling Romulus to a 6-0 victory.

DARRYL ALLEN threw a perfect game in Farmington's 7-0 decision over Van Dyke. The sophomore permitted only two balls to be hit to the outfield and was behind only one batter. He struck out 10.

The Albion Track Story: Nostalgia--and Excitement

1,000 athletes from 64 schools.

ALBION—The curtain will be dropped here Saturday on a dedicated athletic career—and may ring up for a new star.

The principals involved are Dale Sprankle, veteran Albion College director of athletics, and Warren (Rex) Cawley, brilliant Farmington High hurdler.

The setting is the 19th annual Albion College invitational track and field meet, which has attracted over 1,000 athletes from 64 schools.

SPRANKLE, in poor health for the last two years, has submitted his resignation after 22 years at Albion. Saturday is definitely his last official day on the job, but doctors have advised him against attending.

Elkin Isaac, who has been named Sprankle's successor as athletic director, will serve as meet director Saturday. Sprankle originated this popular invitational in 1937 after coming to Albion from Adrian College.

Cawley is the 17-year-old Farmington senior who is seeking national high school records in both the high and low hurdles.

Only last Saturday he was deprived of national hurdle recognition when a six to eight-mile-an-hour wind rubbed out his efforts on four occasions at the Central Michigan relays.

INKSTER, in Class A; East Jackson, in Class C; and Norman-Dickson High of Brethren, in Class D, are defending champions who will be back to defend their titles. River Rouge, the Class B winner a year ago, is not entered.

After his appearance at Albion, Cawley and a few of his team mates will compete against track men from 31 other schools at the third annual Dick Waters Invitational Relays at Monroe High School.

Cawley, however, will not be there early enough for the hurdle preliminaries and will compete in the high and broad jumps instead.
