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Jones 2nd, Cawley 5th, 6th in Hurdles at National AAU

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(SPECIAL TO THE DETROIT NEWS) BOULDER, Colo., June 20.—High school boy Rex Cawley did not qualify for the American track team that will face Russian and Pan-American rivals this summer, but the 18-year-old from Farmington, Mich.,

has stamped himself a contender for a spot on next year's Olympic team.

Running one of the most exhausting schedules of any entrant in the National AAU championships yesterday, Cawley placed fifth in the 110-meter high hurdles and sixth in the 400-meter hurdles. He had to run two races in each event, and he shared the fastest qualifying time of 51.3 seconds in the longer event.

Hayes Jones, Eastern Michigan's National Collegiate high hurdles champion, made the team but failed by inches to retain his AAU title. Olympic champion Lee Calhoun beat him as both were timed in 14 seconds.

The first two men in each event qualified to face Russia July 18-19 at Philadelphia. The third American in each event will be added to the U.S. team for the Pan-American Games Aug. 27-Sept. 7 at Chicago.

Four other 1956 Olympic titlists joined Calhoun as winners in yesterday's eight events, but the "Bobby Morrow era" ended.

The triple gold medalist, who injured a leg two weeks ago,

said it didn't bother him, but he ran last in a nine-man preliminary heat of the 100-meter dash. He was to defend his AAU 200-meter title in today's 13 events, but apparently had little chance.

Ray Norton, of San Jose State, won the 100 in a fine turnabout. Last week at the NCAA, Norton was disqualified when Charlie Tidwell, of Kansas, caused him to jump the gun by moving an elbow. Tidwell, who then won

Olympic champ Glenn Davis lost his first 400-meter hurdles race in three years when he finished second to Dick Howard, of New Mexico, 50.7 seconds to 50.9.

Although O'Brien set the only record, performances were so good that Bill Nieder, who put the shot more than 60 feet, got only fourth place and failed to qualify for the international meets, and Ernie Shelby, three-time AAU broad jump champion, cleared more than 25 feet and placed only fifth.

Cawley's 51.3 in the hurdles trials was the fastest ever run by a high school boy, and he followed with 51.9 in the finals. In the highs, he did 14.5 in both trials and finals.

John Telford, former Wayne State star from Detroit, was eliminated when he ran fifth in his heat of the 400-meter dash. Otis Davis, former Miller High athlete now at Oregon, also failed to qualify, placing third in his heat of the 400.
