3 Track Marks Fall

Everyone spoke in superlatives during the Public School track semifinals yesterday at Pershing. Spectators were treated to the finest performances in the meet's history.

Continuing the outstanding achievements that have marked prep track meets this spring, three records were broken and another was tied.

Henry Carr, Southwestern's brilliant 16-year-old star, set records of 9.7 seconds in the 100-yard dash and 21 seconds in the 220; Jerry Burrell, of Northern, leaped 22 feet 11 1/2 inches to better the broad jump mark that had stood since 1924; and Lonnie Sanders, of Pershing, tied the 180-yard low hurdles time of :19.7.

Carr's sprint records came within an hour of each other. The Southwestern sprinter clipped a tenth of a second from the former mark of :09.8 for the 100-yard dash made last year by Claude Miller, of Cass, and two-tenths of a second from his own record of :21.2, made in the West Side meet last week.

"He's a once-in-a-lifetime runner and could be another Jesse Owens," said Northwestern Coach Tom Hendrick.

Carr's records will stand although a wind gauge wasn't used.

"We've never used a gauge in the past but will adopt it next year," said meet director James Stout. Dave Beauvais

and Leighton Boyd, who acted as co-referees and starters, were confident the tailwind was less than 4.473 miles an hour, the maximum permitted.

Only those who came early saw Burrell, add a quarter of an inch to the broad jump record of 22 feet 11 1/2 established 35 years ago by Cliff Robinson, of Northwestern. The 18-year-old, 149 - pound, 5 - foot - 10 Northern senior, set the new mark on his third jump. His first effort was only 21 feet 4 3/4, but he hit 22-6 1/2 on the next jump.

"We felt Jerry would break the record after he jumped 22 feet 9 3/4 in the East Side meet last week," said Northern Coach Buck Weaver. "I knew he could do if he 'climbed the stairs' (had good height on his jump). I placed a piece of paper beyond 23 feet and told Jerry to aim for it."

Sanders equaled the low hurdles mark in winning his heat. Felton Rogers, of Eastern, who had set the record in the East

Side meet, was a tenth of a second slower in his heat.

The finals will be held tomorrow, and Mumford became the favorite to win team honors by placing 14 individuals and two relay teams to 11 individuals and one relay for Redford, the 1958 champion.

Mumford will score points in all events except the shot put and mile run, while Redford has no qualifiers in the 100, 220, high jump, high and low hurdles, and half-mile relay.

Field events will begin at 2 p.m. and the races at 3:30.

PRACTICE AT 7:30

"Our hitting practices paid off," beamed Coach John Radwanski. "I had the squad drill on their batting for 25 minutes both on Memorial Day and Sunday at 7:30 a.m. after we got only four hits in winning, 2-1, over St. Paul's last week."

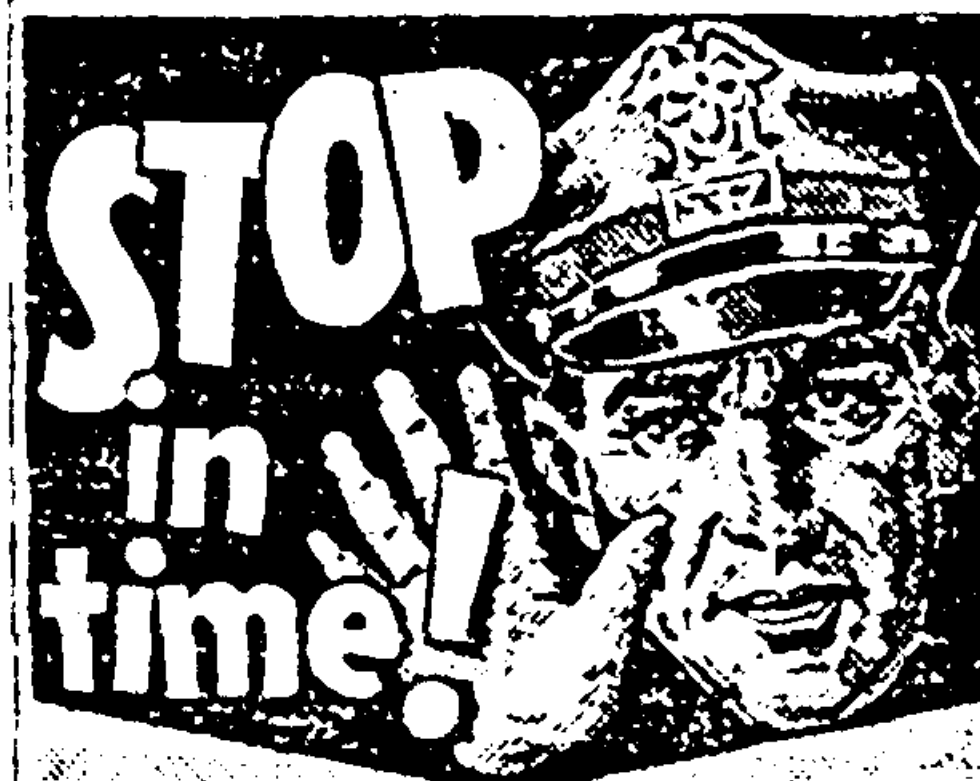
