

Hayes Jones and Cawley in Pan Am

BOULDER, Colo., June 20—They were overshadowed in a record-shattering hurdle race at the National AAU track and field championships here today, but two Michigan boys—Hayes Jones and Warren (Rex) Cawley—won berths on the U.S. team for the Pan American Games.

Jones, the NCAA hurdles champion from Eastern Michigan College, ran second to Kansas University's Charles Tidwell as the latter broke his own American record in the 200-meter low hurdles. Cawley was third.

TOP THREE QUALIFY

The top three performers in each of the AAU events automatically gain places of the American squad for the Pan American Games at Chicago, Aug. 28-Sept. 27.

Tidwell, fending off the down-to-the-wire threat of Jones, blazed over the 200-meter distance in 22.6 seconds, 1/10 of a second better than his old American mark and 7/10 of a second faster than Harrison Dillard's AAU mark of 23.3.

Actually, Jones and Cawley also eclipsed Dillard's mark. Jones was clocked at 22.7 and Cawley in 23 seconds flat. Ironically, Elias Gilbert, of Winston Salem Teachers College, who holds the world record for the event (22.1 on a straight-away), finished fourth today. His time was 23.4. This race was around one curve.

DOUBLE WINNER

Ray Norton, of San Jose State College, became the only double winner in the two-day meet by taking the 200-meter dash in 20.8 seconds. Norton won Friday's 100-meter dash in 10.5 seconds.

Besides Tidwell's record-shattering hurdles sprint, two other AAU marks fell today.

Oregon's Dyrón Burleson shaved four-tenths of a second off the 1,500-meter record of 3:47.9, held since 1949 by Walter Mehl.

Al Oerter, one-time Kansas State athlete who was a gold medal winner in the 1956 Olympic Games, cracked the discus mark with a heave of 186, five inches. It was 4.5 inches better than the mark set in 1953 by Minnesota's Fortune Gordien.

Burleson, 19, had to catch his Oregon University teammate, Jim Grelle, on the final lap to become winning the event by seven yards. Burleson's time was 3:47.5 and Grelle's 3:38.4. Grelle had won the NCAA mile last week.

Defending AAU champion Eddie Southern, of Texas, had an easy time winning the 400-

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meter dash. The 21-year-old sensation covered the distance in 46.1 seconds, beating his nearest challenger, Dave Mills, of Purdue, by a good five yards. Southern had won the equivalent 440-yard run at the AAU meet in 1958.
