

**37-MAN TRACK TEAM PICKED****14 'Repeaters' Face Russia**

BOULDER, Colo., June 22.—  
What a difference a year makes.

Of 37 men who qualified over the week end for the American track team that will meet Russia next month, only 14 were on the squad that traveled to Moscow last summer.

Only four of the United States' 11 winners will defend their

titles when the Russians come to Philadelphia July 18-19.

Never fear, though. Coach Frank Potts, of Colorado, who'll handle the U.S. squad, said it is "at least as strong as last year. We have no worries in the hurdles, appear to be strong in sprints and are much better off in the metric mile."

One of the repeaters is Hayes Jones, Eastern Michigan junior

from Pontiac, Mich. Jones, who placed second to America's Ancel Robinson last July at Moscow, was second to Lee Calhoun here in the National AAU meet. Two men in each event made the U.S. team.

Another Michigan star, hurdler Rex Cawley, of Farmington High, earned a trip to a series

of Scandinavian meets July 22-Aug. 26. Cawley placed third in the low hurdles, fifth in the highs and sixth in the 400-meter hurdles at the AAU, only man to score in all three barrier events.

Despite his third in the lows, however, he did not make the U.S. team for the Pan-American Games. The low hurdles are not an international event. The first three placers in other events were selected for the Games Aug. 27-Sept. 7 at Chicago.

Defending the victories they won last year against Russia will be Glenn Davis, 400-meter hurdles; Parry O'Brien, shot put; Harold Connelly, hammer; and Jim Grelle, 1,500 meters. Grelle, however, was pushed back to second in the AAU by Dyrol Burleson, a freshman at Oregon, where Grelle is a varsity man. Burleson set an AAU record of 3:47.9, despite the mile-high altitude which usually spells disaster to fast distance-running.

Only 13 members of the 1956 Olympic team qualified to face Russia—but seven are Olympic champions: Davis, Calhoun, O'Brien, Connolly, discus thrower Al Oerter, broad jumper Greg Bell and high jumper Charlie Dumas.

Ray Norton, named the outstanding athlete in the AAU after winning the 100 and 200-meter dashes, was assigned a busy summer. He'll face Russia, then lead the six-man Scandinavian team on which Cawley will run, and finally compete in the Pan-Am Games.
