of Scandinavian meets July 22-Aug. 20. Cawley placed third in the low hurdies, fifth in the highs and sixth in the 400-meter hurdles at the AAU, only man to score in all three barrier events.

Despite his third in the lows, however, he did not make the U.S. team for the Pan-American Games. The low hurdles are not an international event. The first three placers in other events were selected for the Games Aug. 27-Sept. 7 at Chicago.

Defending the victories they won last year against Russia will be Glenn Davis, 400-meter hurdles; Parry O'Brien, shot put; Harold Connelly, hammer; and Jim Grelle, 1,500 meters. Grelle, however, was back to second in the AAU by Dyrol Burleson, a freshman at Oregon, where Grelle is a varsity man. Burleson set an AAU record of 3:47.9. despite mile-high altitude which usually spells disaster to fast distance running. Only 13 members of the 1956

Olympic team qualified to face Russia—but seven are Olympic (1 champions: Davis, Calhoun, O'Brien, Connolly, discus thrower Al Oerter, broad jumper Greg Bell and high jumper Charlie Dumas. Ray Norton, named the out-

standing athlete in the AAU after winning the 100 and 200meter dashes, was assigned a busy summer. He'll face Russia, then lead the six-man Scandinavian team on which Cawley will run, and finally compete in the Pan-Am Games.
