Crane Baseball Squad Wins Three, Drops One

In the first of four non-league games last week, the Cranes baseball team swept to a 10-2 victory over Grosse Pointe high school last Wednesday.

Behind the strong pitching of Dick Mosher, who now has a 2-1 record, the Cranes were never in

The big guns for Cranbrook were Bill Mosher and George Martin, who both got two singles and accounted for 3 runs in apiece.

In the second game of the week against Flint Northern, the Cranes took the short end of a 3-1 score after ten innings of play.

CRANBROOK'S ONLY tally came in the seventh inning on a double by Bill Mosher, who then stole third base and scored on a fielder's choice.

Maples Finish Third In State Track Meet

Steve Jacobson, a virtual one-man team, gave Seaholm third place in the state track meet at Ann Arbor Saturday by winning the broad jump and finishing second in both

It was Birmingham's best finish standing prep track man in Mich-since achieving Class A status. Last year the Maples wound up only to Pea Saturday.

A dozen other Seaholm athletes made the trip but, as it turned out, except for Dan Reid who gathered two points by placing fifth in the mile, it was all Jacobson in the scering.

.FOR A WHILE the big junior must have thought he had ended up in East Lansing where the Big Ten track meet was being held instead of at a high school finals.

He ran the 220 yard dash in :21.4, the same time with which the University of Michigan's Tom Robinson was winning that event in the Big Ten meet-but finished second!

The time was three-tenths of a second faster than the state record set back in 1925, but Flint Northern's Maurice Pea ran the distance

in :21.3 to win.

In the broad jump, Jacobsen leaped 23 feet 7½ inches, only six inches short of the distance which proved the best in the Big Ten competition. It gained the Seaholm boy first place all right but fell an inch and a fraction short of the state record.

AND IN THE 100 yard dash, it was Pea again, winning in :09.8 to tie the state record with Jacob-

son right on his heels. Later "Jake", as his teammates call him, ran a spectacular anchor leg of the 880-relay in the fastest heat but it went for naught. Two poor baton exchanges slowed the unit down and it failed to place.

As it turned out, the best the Maples could have hoped for was third place. Pontiac Central and Flint Northern ran away with the meet, with Pontiac finally winning 44 to 41. Birmingham had 18 points. Dearborn was fourth with

Earlier in the week Seaholm easily defeated Port Huron in one dual meet and won over Pontiac Central by four points in another in which those athletes who had qualified for the state finals did not compete.

Tomorrow the Maples go to Mt. Clemens for their last dual meet of the year. The Eastern Michigan league meet will be held at Kimball next Tuesday at 4 p.m.
