

Lary Falters - So Do Bengals, 7-4

This Time Tigers Play 'Giveaway'

(From Press Wire Services.)

The angry Baltimore Orioles, who virtually handed Detroit a victory Friday night by falling apart in the ninth inning, refused to play "giveaway" Saturday as they soundly trounced the Tigers, 7 to 4, in Detroit.

Rookie Ronnie Hansen's double with the bases loaded in the fifth inning sparked a four-run rally and the Orioles added three more in the sixth to overcome an early Detroit lead.

Tiger starter Frank Lary, who retired the first 12 men who faced him, carried a 3-0 bulge into the fifth but got into trouble when Gene Woodling was safe on an error and Jim

Gentile and Clint Courtney followed with singles to load the bases, setting the stage for Hansen's timely blow.

Hansen scored the fourth run of the inning on pinch-hitter Bob Boyd's single which sent Lary to the showers.

Courtney's two-run homer, his first of the season, Hansen's second double and relief pitcher Gordon Jones' single accounted for Baltimore's runs in the sixth off Ray Semproch, the second of four Detroit pitchers.

The victory went to Jones who hurled brilliantly the last five innings and gave up one run. It was his first win of the season against no losses.

The Tigers got off to an early lead with a run in the second on Frank Bolling's triple and Red Wilson's single. They tallied two more in the third inning on a single by Eddie Yost, Neil Chrissy's double and a single by Norm Cash.

The three-run lead looked like more than enough for Lary who entered the game with a 1.87 earned run average and was flawless in mowing down the Orioles in the first four innings. His record is now 3-3.

Detroit scored its other run in the sixth on a walk, infield

Derby Winner Flops

Bally Ache Tops Rich Preakness

Baltimore —**A**— Bally Ache, the million and a quarter dollar beauty who was sold a week ago to a blue grass syndicate, led all the way Saturday to capture the \$175,000 Preakness as Kentucky Derby winner Venetian Way rambled home next to last in a field of six 3-year-olds.

Two weeks ago Bally Ache, then owned by Leonard Fruchman of Toledo, Ohio, started as a second choice to Tompion in the Derby at Louisville, but was 3½ lengths behind Venetian Way at the end of the one and one-quarter mile grind.

In this 84th Preakness, Victoria Park finished second, followed by Celtic Ash, Divine Comedy, Venetian Way and T. V. Lark.

This time, jockey Bob Ussery of Vian, Okla., sent the bay son of Bally Dam-Celestial Blue to the front at once near the gate at the head of the ancient Pimlico stretch where this famed race first was run in 1873.

Took Lead.

The colt with the upset stomach moniker took it from there.

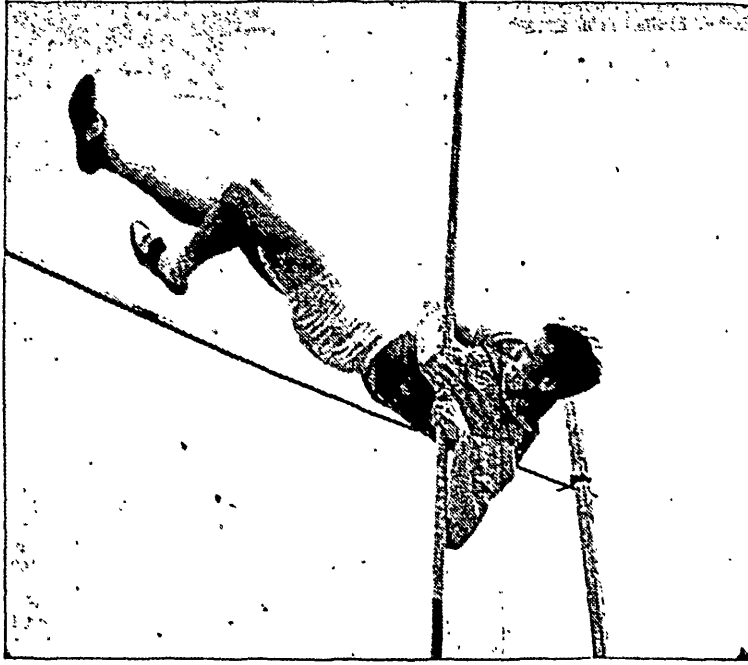
Bally Ache, purchased by the Turfland Inc. syndicate headed by Joseph L. Arnold of Versailles, Ky., for 1½ million dollars, bounced home under gray skies an easy four-length winner over Victoria Park.

Victoria Park, last year's 2-year-old champion in Canada, and owned by E. P. Taylor, the Toronto industrialist, was a length and three-quarters ahead of the Liangollen Farm's Divine Comedy.

Venetian Way, who had been runner-up most of the way began to fade at the top of the home-stretch after the first mile and gradually dropped back to fifth, beaten 8½ lengths at the wire by the winner. It knocked out and chance of another triple crown champion with the Belmont stakes coming up June 11.

The time for the 1 3/16 mile race on a fast, but deep and sandy track, was 1:56½ compared with Nashua's Preakness and track record of 1:54½ in 1955.

This was the second Preakness attempt for Ussery, who finished fifth with Nah Hiss in 1957.

Calvin MIAA Track Champ

Distancemen Lead Knights To First Conference Crown

Kalamazoo—Distance runners Barry Koops and Jim DeBie Saturday paced Calvin college to its first track championship in nine years of competition in the Michigan Intercollegiate Athletic association here Saturday.

Coach Dave Tuuk's Calvin Knights racked up 51 points in the rain-slowed meet to edge out Kalamazoo, which had 49 for second place in the conference meet.

Hope scored 27 1/5 points, Hillsdale 30, defending Champion Albion 22½, Alma 19½, Olivet 10½ and Adrian 5.

Koops, DeBie 1-2.

Koops and DeBie placed 1-2 in both the mile and two-mile events to spark the surprising Calvin triumph.

The only record performance was the 1:58.9 880-yard run by Hope's Jim Rozeboom. It cracked the 1:59.7 standard set by Jim Krider of Albion last year.

Field events were contested on a dry field, but all of the running finals were on a wet track, making some of the times rather unimpressive.

Host Kalamazoo college was declared winner in tennis although the championship matches were cancelled at the midpoint because of the heavy rain. And Kalamazoo walked away with the league's all-sports trophy for the year.

Illinois Outlasts U. of M For Big Ten Track Title

East Lansing—**A**—With George Kerr, a senior from Jamaica, winning the 440 and 880-yard runs and anchoring a great mile relay triumph, Illinois overwhelmed Michigan 61½-45 Saturday to capture its third straight outdoor Big Ten track championship.

The meet was devoid of conference records with wind disallowing the closest approach—a mark-matching :09.4 in the 100 by Michigan's Tom Robinson.

Robinson, a junior from the Bahamas, also won the 220 in 21.4 to become the only other double-winner besides Kerr.

Kerr won the 440 in :46.1 by 15 feet over Willie Atterberry of Michigan State. Thirty minutes later he came back to retain his 880-yard crown in 1:51.6, beating teammate Ted Beastall by 25 feet.

In all, Illinois captured six first places and four seconds while Michigan took five blue ribbons and three thirds in the upper point bracket.

Michigan smashed Illinois 57½ to 45½ in winning this year's indoor championship. (Continued on page 33, column 1.)

Cambridge, Mass.—**W**—Methodical John Thomas bettered the world high jump record again Saturday, sailing over the bar at seven feet, 1¾ inches.

The 19-year-old Boston sophomore—a study of co-ordination and concentration—cleared in the record height on his first try as the highlight of the 73rd New England intercollegiate track meet at Massachusetts Institute of Technology. Thomas was then unsuccessful in three tries at 7-2¼.

Breaking the seven-foot barrier for the 21st time in 16 months, Thomas improved upon his 7-1½ leap at the Penn relays April 30. That effort is pending for official recognition to erase Russian Yuri Stepanov's 7-1 (1957). Thomas cleared 7-½ on the way up to the higher altitude.

Thomas has jumped 7-2½ indoors but only outdoor performances are eligible for global acceptance.

In five collegiate jumps outdoors, Thomas has cleared, in order: 7-½, 7-1½, 7-1¼, 7-0, 7-1½, 7-1¾.

Athens, Ohio —**W**—Western Michigan retained the Mid-American conference championship in tennis and track and Ohio university took its fourth straight golf trophy in the finals of the fourteenth annual MAC spring sports carnival Saturday.

Ohio university also completed its sports year with 47 points to win the conference all-sports trophy, which includes football, basketball, baseball, track, cross-country, wrestling, swimming, golf and tennis.

Western Michigan trackmen broke four conference records Saturday and placed first in two other events to pile up a team total of 78 points. Bowling Green also had six individual firsts.

How the other teams finished: Miami (Ohio) 65½, Bowling Green 64, Ohio university 33½, Kent State 10, and Marshall (W.Va.) 4.

Ohio won the golf with 719. How the other teams finished: Western Michigan 763, Bowling Green 778, Marshall 786, Kent State 792, Miami 805 and Toledo 840.

Western-Michigan won five of six matches and scored 17 points to retain its tennis crown.

Ecorse 1st In Thriller

Wins Class B Crown In Tense Meet Here

Ecorse had to battle down to the finish line in the final event to win the state class B high school track team championship by less than two points from Cranbrook Saturday at Houseman field.

Ecorse grabbed six first places to pile up its winning 483/11-point total, while Cranbrook gained only three first

places, but landed several seconds and thirds to wind up with a total of 466/11 points.

Ecorse and Cranbrook were the only teams in the race for the championship as Fenton finished third, far back with 173/11 points.

Ecorse went into the final event — the 880-yard relay — leading Cranbrook by less than a point and won by scant yards over Cranbrook in 1:34.4.

Showers, which had dampened the track before the preliminaries started in the morning, returned about halfway through the afternoon finals and continued intermittently through the rest of the meet.

Two records were broken—the high jump and 120-yard high hurdles mark the latter twice.

Star of the meet and only double winner was Chuck Gray, who led Ecorse to its title by equalling the new record of 14.5 seconds in winning the 120-yard high hurdles final over Bob Sherman of Durand, who had set the 14.5 mark in the morning preliminaries. Sherman finished second behind Gray in the finals. Gray also won the 180-yard low hurdles by .2 second over Sherman in 20.3 seconds.

Previous high hurdles mark was 14.9 seconds, set by David Hill of Ypsilanti in 1949.

Another Record.

The high jump record also fell to Ecorse as Jerry Holmes, a 17-year-old junior, cleared 6 feet 2½ inches, breaking the old mark of 6 feet 2 by William Dale of Wayne in 1942.

Only west Michigan area winners came in the half-mile, where Rush Ring of Sparta won his final heat by 30 yards in 2:03.3 and Ron Wood of Belding who won his heat in 2:02.1.

Dave Barrett, East Grand Rapids star, who won the 880 in the regional meet with a time of 2:00.9, was ill Saturday and unable to compete.

Clarence Brown of Ecorse scored an upset in winning the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet 6 inches. Larry Schoonmaker, of Wyoming Park, who had jumped 22 feet earlier in the season, failed to place Saturday, while Chuck Sidnam, of Grandville, who had a jump of 21 feet 11 this season, had to settle for a tie for second Saturday on 20 feet 11 inches.

Chuck Ogden of Cranbrook scored perhaps the biggest upset of the meet by defeating Jan Bowen of Alma in the mile Ogden beat Bowen by ten yards in 4:34.2 Saturday, while Bowen had run a couple of 4.28 miles earlier this season.

Jack Paton of Fenton won the shotput to make his record perfect for the season. Paton, a Fenton senior, had won the shot event in all 11 meets in which Fenton had competed earlier this season, but his winning toss of 53 feet 2 inches was the best of his career.

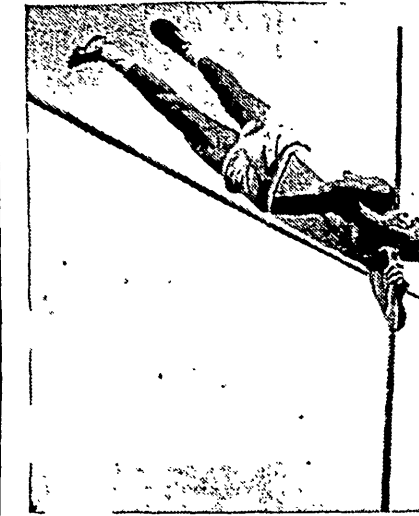

The seven Grand Rapids schools with a total of nine individuals and three relay teams failed to land a point in the large field dominated by the eastern section of the state.

Two new marks went into the record book and another was tied in Saturday's fierce competition on a fast track and brisk winds. Dearborn's Al Ammerman broke the high jump mark with a 6-4½ performance.

Pontiac Central's Bredehl Pritchett, 6-4, 225-pound junior shotput star, shattered Muskegon's Joel Boyden's standard of 57 feet made in 1954 when he tossed the 12-pound iron 59 feet 5¼ inches in his next to final throw. Just last Tuesday Pritchett hurled the iron ball 58 feet 11 inches against Grosse Pointe.

Flint Sprinter Gets Brief Break From Wind

Ann Arbor—Lady luck smiled on Flint Northern's Maurice Pea for just 30 seconds, enabling the senior sprint ace to tie an old record in the 100-yard dash here Saturday in the Michigan class A track championships at University of Michigan's Ferry field.

A high wind that blew hard all day, died down for less than a minute while the 100 was in progress.

Pea, 18, rated the top sprinter in the state, responded with a terrific 9.8 performance, tying the records held by George Hester of Detroit Northern (1925), Edward Tolan (Detroit Cass, Tech, 1927) and Sebert Dan, Alpena (1955). Pea did a 21.3 in the 220, breaking the record of 21.7, but it was disallowed because of the high wind in the morning preliminaries. Pea also did 9.8 in the 100, but an eight-mile an hour wind nullified the time. He also tied the 220 with a 21.7, tying Hester and Alonzo Harris of Pontiac Central (1953). The wind was blowing at five miles per hour.

Under state regulations the wind mustn't exceed over 4.473 miles per hour.

After Pea's stellar performance in the century in the afternoon, the wind came up again stopping his attempt to tie or break the 220 mark.
