UNIONVILLE'S GANGLER BREAKS POLE VAULT MARK

Records Assaulted In Prep Track Finals

(By The Associated Press)

Unionville High's Ken Gangler shattered a record that stood for 24 years as the state high school championships were held at three sites Saturday.

THE CLASS C-D finals were held at Mount Pleasant; Class B at Grand Rapids; and Class A at Ann Arbor.

Gangler broke the Class D pole vault record, the oldest one on the books, with a leap of 11' 6½". The old mark of 11-5 was set in 1936 by Anthony Mazy of Middleton.

Blue Water District high schools found the out-state competition rough as Unionville, which finished eighth in Class D, had the highest ranking with 11 points. North Branch of the South Central C Conference picked up eight points; in Class C.

North Branch scored its points as Ron Ward took fourth in the mile run and Guntis Terauds, Class C regional pole vault and hurdler champion, was second in the pole vault.

Harbor Beach's Bob Kanaga was second in the Class C broad jump. Peck's Dick Belger ended up in a three-way tie for fourth in the high jump.

Elkton's Jerry Bittner was third in the 880-yard run. Milington's Gail Hallwood grabbed sixth in the 100-yard dash. Unionville placed third in the medley relay.

Frankenmuth, Class C regional king, had only Walt Reinbold place fourth in the 220 yard dash.

HASLETT CAPTURED the Class C championship with 19 points, followed by East Jackson with 17. Covert High, with a well-balanced team that ran up a 10½-point advantage, dethroned Schoolcraft as the Class D champion.

East Jackson's Dick Pickering ran the Class C mile in 4:33.4 to

erase the record of 4:35.1 set in 1944 by John Klever of Grant Ecorse High, Marsyville Invitational champion, earned 48 3/11 points to 46 6/11 for Cranbrook in Class B.

ECORSE JUNIOR Jerry Holmes cracked the 18-year-old record in the high jump with a leap of 6' 2½". The old 6-2 mark was set in 1942 by William Dale of Wayne.

The 1949 record of .14.9 in the 120-yard Class B high hurdles, set by David Hill of Ypsilanti, fell in a preliminary run by Bob Sherman of Durand with a time of .14.5. His mark was tied in the finals by Charles Gray of Ecorse. Sherman ran second in the finals.

Marysville's Bob Green, St. Clair Area League half-mile champion the last two years, finished second for the second straight year in the 880-yard run. Ron Horning of Sturgis

turned in a 2:03.3 clocking to nip Green.

Cass City's Paul Holmberg, regional Class B 100 and 220 yard winner, was fourth in the 220 yard event.

Pontiac Central, led by its powerful shot put trio and the hurdling of Leon Prentis, nosed out Flint Northern in the next to last event to win the Class A crown.

Shot putters Bredell Pritchett, Jerry Rush, both of whom smashed the old state record of 57 feet, combined with teammate Charlie Brown for 14 points to propel Pontiac to its fifth state title in the past six years. Pritchett tossed the shot 59' 5¼".

PONTIAC finished with 44 points and edged Flint Northern by three and offset a brilliant one-man show by Northern's Maurice Pea, Birmingham, of the Eastern Mich-

igan League, finished third with 18.

Pea, Northern's great sprinter, won the 100 and 220-yard dashes and anchored the leg of the winning 880-yard relay. His time of 9.8 for the 100-yard dash tied the state mark set 35 years ago, and tied twice since.
