

# Regardless, Seaholm Thinclads Greatest

One more piece of unfinished business remains for Birmingham Seaholm High's 1960 track team.

Regardless of what the Maples do in Saturday's All-Oakland County championships, the campaign now ending must go down as the greatest in Birmingham's history.

AFTER EARLY championships in the Huron, Central and Monroe relay carnivals, Birmingham swept to a regional title, then took third in the state finals and last night annexed its sixth consecutive Eastern Michigan League flag.

Only Ferndale provided Birmingham with any kind of opposition in the EML. The

Maples rolled up 76 points to Ferndale's 50½. Hazel Park lagged in third with 16, Royal Oak Kimball and East Detroit each had 15, Mount Clemens 14½ and Port Huron 14.

Four league records went by the boards with Birmingham's relays accounting for half of the new standards. The 880-relay quartet was timed in 1:31.5 and the medley in 2:37.9.

Ferndale's Dori Reid made the big individual news with a record effort of 21.8 in the 220 and a record-tying time of 10 seconds flat in winning the 100.

Bob Foulcher, Hazel Park's state champ, accounted for the fourth record with a 1.58.5 clocking in the half mile.

In addition to Reid, Birmingham's Bob Robertson in the hurdles and Larry Tragoning of Ferndale in the high jump and 440 emerged as double winners.
