

## Gala Sports Card A Festival Feature

American athletes far outdistanced their Canadian rivals Saturday as the first annual United States-Canada International Sports Games were staged locally.

The U.S. competitors dominated the track and field, softball and boxing activities at Windsor Stadium and also emerged victorious in an international soccer match at Wigle Park.

Canadian teams managed an even split of the baseball competitions at Stoddell Park and posted a surprise victory in the tug-of-war pulls at the stadium.

The track and field activity held the spotlight for more than four hours and the small crowd in attendance witnessed some dazzling individual performances turned in by thickets from the Detroit Track Club and Suburban Detroit Track Club.

Of the 11 senior events on the program, Detroit entries captured 10 of them. And, in the junior events, the American cinder stars triumphed in nine of the 10 events.

Ken Burnley of the Detroit Track Club, who won the 220 and 440, was the senior individual champion while Steve Jacobson, an unattached competitor from Detroit, captured the 100, 220 and broad jump to emerge as junior individual champion.

The Detroit Track Club won the senior team title with 69 points while the Windsor Legion Olympic club bagged the junior team honors with 38 points. The suburban Track Club was runner-up in both classes.

Only notable performance by the Windsor Legion team came in the junior 880-yard relay. Bill Gala, Frank Walton, Wayne Logan and Chuck Zeilig teamed up to win that race in 1:32.7.

Among the day's most outstanding individual performances was Len Robinson's leap of 13 feet, 8 inches in the pole vault, Frank Carissimi's 4:22.0 effort in the senior mile and the Detroit Track Club's dazzling dash of 42.7 seconds in the senior 440-yard relay.

In softball, the Detroit Police blanked the Windsor Police, 4-0, on the new Windsor Stadium diamond. The same two teams will play a return game this evening at Palmer Park in Detroit.

politan Police crew won two straight pulls from the Detroit Police team. This marked Toronto's second victory over Detroit in 28 years of tug-of-war competitions.

Toronto took the first pull in one minute and 41.7 seconds. Then, after a 15-minute rest period, the Queen City contingent returned to take the second pull in two minutes, 52.0 seconds.

In addition to these actual competitions, the Windsor Tennis Club engaged the Detroit Tennis Club in a series of friendly matches at the Jackson Park courts and the Windsor Gymnastic Club was on hand for a well-executed gymnastics exhibition.
