

3d Record for Carr; Carissimi in 4:18 Mile

Henry Carr was content to let two of his Metropolitan League track marks stand for another week at least, but just to stay in form, added one more to the record book.

Carr paced Northwestern to the west side track title yesterday as the Colts registered 127½ points to score in a romp.

Mumford took the east side crown handily by tallying 122 points. Eastern was the Mustangs' closest competitor with 88 points.

FOUR RECORDS fell in the east side meet.

Frank Carissimi of Denby set a new mark in the mile when he circled the oval four times in 4:18.

Mumford's Ken Burnley, the meet's only double winner, established a new 220-yard record around the curve when he hit the tape in 21.7 seconds.

Northern's Sam Davidson tied the championship record

in the 180-yard low hurdles with 19.7.

Mumford's medley relay team of David Montgomery, Cliff Van Franzel, Leon Linderman and Elvin Roper cracked the championship clocking with 2:27.2.

MUMFORD also won the half-mile relay and scored a tie for first in the pole vault when Cleveland Horne matched Eastern's Charles Lewis' 11-foot 8-inch performance.

The brilliant Carr, who set records in the 100 and 220-yard dashes in the preliminaries Wednesday with 9.6 and 20.8-second clockings, respectively, once again stood head and shoulders above the field as he established a new city broad jump mark of 23 feet 4¾ inches.

It only took Hustlin' Henry one leap to crack the old standard of 23-feet ¾-inch.

Then, in the 100-yard dash, he "coasted" at 9.8 and in the 220 jumped far ahead of the field, got to within 50 yards

of the tape and looked back at the rest of the field some 10 yards back. He practically jogged the rest of the way to finish a poor 21.8.

CARR CAME back later and anchored the Northwestern half-mile relay team. When he took the baton, the Colts had a lead of five yards over Redford but, by the time Carr reached the finish line, the margin was 20 yards.

In running the fastest mile ever by a schoolboy in Michigan, Carissimi ran the first quarter in 64 seconds, the half-mile in 2:10.5, the three-quarters in 3:15 and the final quarter in a spectacular 62 seconds.

Carr's teammate, Fred Hatcher, set a new city shot put record with a heave of 56 feet 1¼ inches. The old mark was 53 feet 10½ inches. Ron Richardson of Southwestern also broke the old standard with a toss of 54 feet to take second.

Northwestern's easy triumph came somewhat as a surprise to Coach Tom Hendricks.

"I thought we'd have our hands full with Redford," he said. "I had to count heavily on our sprinters to overshadow Redford's great distance power.

"The sprinters came up with a terrific performance and we had the first place power all the way."

NORTHWESTERN won five individual events and two relays. The Colts' strength in the sprints became obvious in the 100 and 220. In the 100, the Colts took first, second and third while they swept the first four positions in the 220, each time paced by the high-flying Carr.
