The national scholastic record for the mile is 4:11, made last year by Dale Story, of Orange, Calif. Archie San Romani Jr., of Wichita, Kan., did 4:08.9 last year as a high school boy in open competition.

Mumford won the East Side team title with 122 points. Northwestern piling up 1271/2 to lead on the West Side.
