

Northern, Central Runners Duel Thursday

City Rivals Clash Early

Northern and Central High kick off the local track season Thursday at 4 p.m. with a dual meet at Viking Field.

Despite having only five lettermen, Northern Coach Norb Badar feels more optimistic after last weekend's second-place finish in the Huron Relays at Eastern Michigan University.

Badar has 114 members on his squad, but only seniors Hue Edwards, Dennis McGee, Warren Buchanan and Chuck Moore and junior Ed Johnson are returnees from last year's unit.

Edwards, captain of this year's team, will be used in the 440-yard run and the 880 relay while Johnson and McGee have the most versatile backgrounds. Johnson can be used in the 440, the mile relay and the 880 relay and McGee will see action during the season in the 100 and 220-yard dashes and the high and low hurdles.

Buchanan specializes in the hurdles and Moore's best event in the 880-yard run.

In the field events, Willie Dent looms as a fine broad jumper

while Al Washington stands out among the high jump prospects. Earl Sawyer, Tom Macksood, Barney Hare and Bruce Gonyea are still fighting for the No. 1 pole vault spot and Reggie Sawtelle, Ray Brown, Emmett Willingham and Irvin Williams are the best bets in the shot put event.

City, Valley and regional 880 champion John Shaw heads 15 lettermen returning for Central's new coach, Carl Krieger. Shaw was defeated outdoors only once last season. Ironically, the defeat came in the state meet.

Others include Ewell Carter in the dashes, Spurgeon Coleman in

the hurdles, Hiram Brisker, Herc Mitchell and Curtis Jones in the 440, Boysie Mathis, Malcolm Alexander and Grover Stephens in the 880 and Bob Deneen in the mile.

Krieger also has five lettermen among eight basketball players who reported this week. They include Bob Barnett, John Turner, Jim Merriwether, Jim Toles and Ben Cooper.

However, the loss of three key lettermen by ineligibility will hamper the Indians. Fred Nickerson, Gerald Vaughn and Aaron Sillman were defeated by the textbooks.

Krieger figures to be strongest in the 880 and mile, weakest in the pole vault.

Others whom Krieger figures as point possibilities include Sherman Wallace in the hurdles and dashes, Roosevelt Dawkins and George Moore in the dashes, Lester Carson, Jewell Baxter, Marvin Mabry and Odell Stinson in the hurdles.

Martin Hoey and Connie Connor are 440 hopefuls while Bill Cooper and Clever Vaughn are 880 men and Ed Bagley, Barry Potter, George Balsler, Jordan Fehlig, Bill Finley and Margin Logan are milers.

Norman Alexander, John Grant, Fred Evans and Charles Millender are weight men while Len Dixon and Ed Petepin are pole vaulters. Krieger hopes to get high jumpers and broad jumpers as well as quartermilers from the basketball crew which includes Cloyce Dickerson, Jim Long and Bill Robinson out for the first time.
