

Cass City And Marysville Run 4-6 In Relays

Cass City and Marysville, a pair of teams experienced in relays, topped eight Blue Water Area teams in the 21st annual Central Relays at Mt. Pleasant Saturday.

Cass City Gavel Club Relays Host, finished fourth in Class B with 20 points and Marysville, annual Marysville Relays Host placed sixth with 14 1/2 points.

noteworthy performance was Kansas' record-breaking triumph in the university two-mile relay.

The Kansas quartet was timed in 7:28.6, which chipped three seconds from the old Drake mark and was the best performance in history by a Big Eight team.

Tennessee State's premier duo of Boston and Miss Rudolph performed in special AAU events. Boston, now ineligible in NCAA competition, won a special broad jump with the year's first 26-foot leap—26.11—

a half-inch shy of Jesse Owens' Drake mark and far behind his own world record of 29.11.

Thomas, the erstwhile sure-fire 7-foot high jumper, failed to crack the 6-9 Drake mark, winning with 6-7 1/2.

Miss Rudolph apparently the big attraction of the record crowd. Wilma, with competition only from five high school girls, could do not better than 11.1, well behind the accepted American record of 10.5 in the 100 yard dash.

Lansing Sexton won the Class A crown but had to go to the final wire to do it. Battling most of the afternoon with Birmingham Seaholm, Sexton finally pulled it out in the final two events.

Muskegon Keetha-Puffer won the Class C title and Michigan School for the Deaf topped the D field. Class C and D were held Friday.

St. Stephen took four points in the B competition on the strength of Dennis Van Troostenberg's second place finish in the 120-yard high hurdles. Other area scores were Vassar 3, Yale 1 1/2, Algonac 1/2, and Cros-Lex 1/6. Port Huron failed to score in Class A.

Cass City's nifty sprint medley team set a new relay record when the foursome of Bob Wright, Tim Anshel, Roger Parker and Paul Holmberg were clocked in 2:34.2. The timing shared one and two-tenths seconds off the 1959 record set by Flint Reardon in 1959. The same group finished third in the 880-yard relay.

Besides Van Troostenberg, two other area athletes gained second place finishes. Holmberg of Cass City in the broad jump with a leap of 21-feet 2 1/2-inches and Tom Harrington of Marysville in the pole vault with a vault of 11-feet six-inches.

Vassar's Bill Johnson placed third in the shot put, Bill Adse of Caro was fourth in the 100-yard dash, Bob Fournier of Algonac was fifth in the pole vault and Marysville's Jerry Hollands and Cros-Lex's Harvey Bricker tied for fifth in the high jump.

MARYSVILLE TOOK third place in the Central Relay and the Vikings captured fourth in the shuttle hurdle relay.

Joe Falls of Waterford was the individual star of the meet. Falls won both the high and low hurdles, ran on the winning shuttle hurdle relay team and placed fourth in the pole vault.

Two records were broken in Class A. Bradford Pelticett of Pontiac set a new shot put record of 38-feet 2 1/2-inches.

Mike Katos of Waterford did the mile in the record time of 4:31.
