There's ample evidence to indicate Friday's winner is the team to beat for the state outdoor championship. Valley schools have monopolized the state crown since 1943 with the exception of 1951. Moreover, seven of nine previous Mount Pleasant champions have gone on to capture the outdoor title.

Ironically, Northern High (1957) and 1958) is the only Mount Pleasant champ which failed to maintain mastery through the state meet.
