Mr. Knorr was a key figure in the 11-man syndicate which purchased the Tigers from the W. O. Briggs estate in October 1956 for \$5,500,000.

He was the first president of the group and served in that capacity until April 1957 when he stepped down to devote more time to his radio interests. His holdings included stations at Detroit-Dearborn, Flint, Saginaw and Jackson. He also was connected with an insurance firm and with various radio and television spe-
