Henry Carr backed up his  
boosters' Thursday that he is the  
nation's fastest high school sprin-  
ter. In registering his finest  
track performance of the season,  
the Northwestern senior equaled  
one world sprint record time and  
tied another national high school  
best. However, neither perform-  
ance will be submitted for re-  
cognition because of a strong wind  
which may have helped him.

Carr raced 100 yards in 9.4  
seconds in a triangular meet  
with Ford and Western, and then  
sprinted 220 yards in 20 seconds  
flat on the Ford track. Jessie  
Owens, of Cleveland East Tech,  
set the prep 100 mark of :9.4 in  
1954. Dave Sime, then of Duke,  
1933 at Chicago, and Jim Jackson,  
of Alameda, Calif., tied in

## Memorial

DETROIT — The Detroit Tigers  
doubleheader with the Los Angel-  
es Angels on Sunday, July 9,  
has been designated by President  
John E. Fetzer as Fred A. Knorr  
Memorial Day, in memory of the  
late radio executive who was  
former president and a director  
of the club at the time of his  
death last December at the age  
of 47.

Fifty per cent of the proceeds  
will be donated to the Knorr  
Foundation and Mrs. Knorr has  
designated Hillsdale College to  
receive the gift. The donation will  
be applied to construction of the  
Fred A. Knorr Memorial Student  
Union Building on the Hillsdale  
campus where both Mr. and Mrs.  
Knorr were students.

The July 9 date selected for  
the memorial doubleheader was  
Mr. Knorr's birth date.

**Mr. Knorr was a key figure in  
the 11-man syndicate which pur-  
chased the Tigers from the W. O.  
Briggs estate in October 1956 for  
\$5,500,000.**

He was the first president of  
the group and served in that  
capacity until April 1957 when  
he stepped down to devote more  
time to his radio interests. His  
holdings included stations at De-  
troit-Dearborn, Flint, Saginaw and  
Jackson. He also was connected  
with an insurance firm and with  
various radio and television spe-  
cialty companies

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
