

Carr 'Loafs' to Record in Trials

Every step Henry Carr takes on the cinder track at Mackenzie High this week leads him closer and closer to Moscow.

His hustling, worrisome coach, Tom Hendricks, has that goal in mind. And so does the stringy Northwestern High sprinter, who won four races and tied one record in the Public School League's West Side track championship trials yesterday.

Carr loped like a gazelle down the black track at Mackenzie yesterday in 20.6 seconds, tying his city league record in the 220-yard dash, and won his semifinal heat of the 100 with ridiculous ease in 9.7 seconds.

For a sideline, he also leaped more than 21 feet to qualifying second in the broad jump. The West Side finals are scheduled for Thursday on the same track.

"I don't want him going all out in the broad jump," said Hendricks, the former Michigan hurdler who as Northwestern's mother hen has won one PSL title and is well on his way to another.

TOO MUCH WIND

"A boy can get hurt too easily in that event, particularly on a cold day. Henry's going to run easy in the heat races. Then, if the wind dies down, he'll go all out in the semifinals."

Carr ran his heats in the 100

and 220 in his sweat shirt, and the wind was more than the allowable 4.47 miles an hour in both. But later in the afternoon when the wind died, he still couldn't get his time down far enough in the 100 to approach his wind-assisted .094 performance of a week ago.

Nor could he come close to the 20 flat he did that same day with a tailwind.

"We're not saving anything," Hendricks said. "It may rain next week during the city finals. Henry is going after the 100 and 220 records Thursday in the west side finals."

TRIP IS GOAL

But Carr, a senior who is pledged by a financial aid tender to the University of Iowa, also has an eye to the future. Hendricks now is raising money to send him to the Golden West Invitational meet at Los Angeles two weeks hence and on to the National AAU meet

at New York's Randall's Island June 23-24.

The first two men in each event of the AAU championships will be asked to join the U.S. team that will compete against the Russians in a dual meet at Moscow in late July.

Northwestern led the qualifiers with 11 men yesterday on the breezy Mackenzie field. Only one other record was approached, that by Redford senior Terry Moore, 18, who ran a 1:56.7 half-mile which missed the city league record set by Mac Umstatt in 1939 by one-tenth of a second.

Redford's Dick Sharkey made a shambles of the mile field, leading the qualifiers in 4:26.1 and winning his heat by more than 40 yards.
