

Henry Carr, the celebrated Northwestern High Athlete, is in Iowa City apparently to enter the University of Iowa, 10 days before he is scheduled to graduate here. Thus, one day after completing his eligibility as a schoolboy sprinter, the long tug-o-war which had been brewing for his athletic services by dozens of the nation's top universities has ended.

Thursday, with his left leg bandaged because of a pulled hamstring muscle, Carr won the 100-yard dash and broad jump and placed second in the 220 to lead the Colts to a second straight City League title.

The 6-3, 190-pound Carr, co holder of the National High School record of 20.6 in the 220 was considered Michigan's top athlete during the last season. A great football halfback and a better than average basketball player, Carr was one of those youngsters who excelled in almost any type of sports competition.

Had he preferred to play baseball he could have been a great football halfback and a better than average basketball player.

Only last Tuesday, before injuring his leg, Carr was caught in 20.1 in the City League 220-yard semifinals. The record, however, was disallowed because he was favored by an eight-mile-an-hour tailwind.

Another former Northwestern High graduate, Forest Evashevski, is the current Iowa athletic director, Jerry Burns, the new head coach and most of his staff, are former Michigan high school coaches.

Carr will find plenty of Michigan classmates on the Iowa Campus.

Bob Grier and Felton Rodgers, both of Eastern High; Bob LeZotte, of Royal Oak Dondero; Gus Kasapis, of Cooley; Paul Krause, of Flint; Bob Sherman, of Durand Al Hinton, of Saginaw, are all prominent members of the Hawkeyes' football squad.
