Olympian Track Marks Smashed

Track quality isn't confined to any single area in Genesee County as indicated by the Flint Olympian Games finals Thursday at Dort Field.

Four junior high schools, two senior highs, and two county schools were generously represented as men and women engaged in a record onslaught which produced 31 new marks and tied four others.

Willie Dent, three-sport star at Northern High, and William Whitaker of Southwestern were the triple winners. Dent won the high and low hurdles and the broad jump in the adult men's division. Whitaker, a Colt junior next month, set records in the 100 and 220-yard dashes and the broad jump in the junior boys' division.

Twin victories were the best efforts in the girls' divisions with DeLaine Brandon, 14-year-old Emerson Junior High student, the most brilliant. She was clocked in a nifty 11.4 seconds for the 100-yard dash and in equally noteworthy 6.2 seconds for the 50-yard dash. Her century time is of national caliber and will earn Miss Brandon a place among the year's best times in that event.

She had plenty of company Thursday as perfect weather and a fast track created the finest conditions for Olympian Games finals in the five-year history of the event.

Sue Fowler created a pair of records in the intermediate girls' division. Edna Grant, 13-year-old from Emerson, and Karen Robinson, 12-year-old from McKinley, each cracked two records in the junior girls' division.

Eva Lou Voller, Beecher High grad, and Marjorie Owen, from Kearsley High, accounted for four first places and three records in the adult division.

Layton Galloway, 13-year-old Whitler student, cracked a pair of dash records in the junior boys' division.

Clemente Paces 24-Hit Attack

Pirates in 19-0 Romp

Roberto Clemente, Pittsburgh's Puerto Rican outfielder, thinks the writers erred when they voted his league's most lopsided shutout teammate Dick Groat, over him as the National League's most valuable player in 1960. Imagine the screams of anguish Roberto will let out if he's overlooked again this year.

The lapping Latin did much to further his cause Thursday night when he cracked five

straight hits to lead a 24-hit onslaught against three St. Louis pitchers. The Pirates won 19-0, the league's most lopsided shutout since the Chicago Cubs thrashed the New York Giants by the same score in 1907.

Whether Clemente wins the MVP title or not, he should, barring a catastrophe, capture the batting title. His mark of 360 is 24 points higher than that of his nearest competitor, Frank Robinson of Cincinnati.

Every starting Pirate participated in the slaughter. Smoky Burgess had a couple of homers and drove in six runs; Dick Stuart had a grand slammer and batted in five; Bill Mazeroski had four hits; and Bill Virdon, Don Hoak and Bob Skinner had three apiece. The modern major league record for the biggest shutout is 21-0.
