Beat Drums for Northern

YPSILANTI—It is way too early to draw any definite conclusions, but Flint Northern made overtures here Saturday night of coming up with another pretty fair track team this spring.

After nine of 13 events in the seventh annual Huron Relays, coach Norb Badar's defending state Class A champions shared the lead with 21 points. Monroe was in the head-to-head struggle with a similar 21 points.

BADAR WAS both surprised

and happy his squad was doing so well in this the first major test of the 1962 schoolboy track season.

Only four performers are around from the 1961 championship squad.

All four holdovers made some valuable contributions. Al Washington won the high jump at 6 feet 3 inches. Last May he tied for the state high jump at 6-2, thus he's already added a full inch to his winning effort of a season ago.

Dalton Kimble, Cliff Finklea, and Ed Johnson, the other three veterans, teamed with newcomer Willie Buck to bring Northern a victory in the 880-yard relay.

Kimble also picked up a fourth place in the 60-yard dash.

MANSFIELD, O., the defending champion here, wasn't out of the running, but coach Harry Mehock's Tigers were having their troubles.

Mansfield, with 15 points in the first nine events, may have lost its chances of repeating when its shuttle hurdle relay team was disqualified in the afternoon preliminaries after one of its members left the starting blocks too soon.

Muskegon Heights, which traveled 185 miles to compete here, was very much in contention with 19 points.

Lead Is Popular In Azalea Open

WILMINGTON, N. C. — (AP) — First-round leader Jim Ferrier leaped back from third position into a tie for the 54-hole lead Saturday in the \$20,000 Azalea Open golf tournament with Mason Rudolph and Billy Maxwell.

Their 209 totals, seven under par, put them a stroke ahead of Dave Maar and two up on Tommy Jacobs going into Sunday's final round.

Maxwell and Rudolph each shot 69, lowest round of a day in which a steady 20-mile-an-hour southerly wind swept the Cape Fear Country Club course, with occasional gusts up to 30 miles an hour.

Only 16 of the 77 players bettered par 72 and 10 others equaled it. Ferrier shot a 70 to move into the thick of the scramble for the top money of \$2,800 awaiting the winner.
