# Northern Regional Track King

ANN ARBOR—Flint Northern's ninth championship in 10 years and Flint Southwestern's runner-up finish weren't enough to wipe out a series of frustrations for Flint track teams in Saturday's regional meet at Ann Arbor High.

Knocked off stride by a morning cloudburst which hampered preliminaries and two finals, Flint seldom hit potentials in the afternoon despite reappearance of the sun. All four Flint teams lost men they

figured to qualify for the state meet next Saturday at University of Michigan.

Three fine efforts by sprinter Dalton Kimble helped Northern offset late challenges by Southwestern and Monroe which finished a surprising third. Kimble took the 100-yard dash in 10 seconds, the 220 in 21.5 and ran the anchor leg of the 880 relay team which won in 1:31.7 to account for 11 1/4 of the Vikings' 37 5-6 points. Southwestern nipped Monroe,

30 5-6 to 30 1-3.

FLINT CENTRAL, runner-up in the Saginaw Valley Conference meet eight days earlier, was fifth in the 11-team field with 24 points. East Lansing was fourth with 25 1/2.

Then came Ann Arbor 18 5-6, Jackson 16 1-3, Adrian 5 1-3, Flint Ainsworth 4, Walled Lake 2-3 and Temperance-Bedford 1-3.

Northern qualified four individuals in five events and two re-

lay teams. Southwestern qualified five individuals in six events and its 880 relay team. Central qualified three individuals in four events and its mile relay team. Ainsworth did not qualify anyone in its first Class A regional.

BESIDES KIMBLE, Northern qualified high jump champion Al Washington (6-0), shot put runner-up Emmett Willingham and Neal Patterson, third in the 880, Ed Johnson, Willie Buck and Cliff

Finklea were other members of the 880 relay team and Ralph Avery, Frank Gause, Johnson and Finklea ran on the runner-up mile relay unit.

However, coaches are not restricted to using the same relay combinations in the state meet.

Southwestern qualifiers are: Roger Elford, second in the 220 and third in the 100; Tyrone Malnic, second in the 440; high jumper Don Younger, tied for second; Jim Bracy, third in the broad jump; and Don Robinson, third in the 220. Robinson, Elford, Maynie and William Whitaker ran on the Colts' runner-up 880 relay team.

Central's trio includes: Bob Barnett, broad jump winner at 22 1/4; Ernie Long, high hurdle champ in meet record time of 14.9 seconds and third in the low hurdles; and Marvin Mabry, low hurdles winner in 21.5. Connie Conner, Jim Toles, Marion Hoy and Barnett ran on the Indians' mile relay unit which placed third.

But all four Flint coaches had reason to be disturbed about the spots they lost.



NORTHERN'S Norbert Badar lost a near-certain placer in the state meet when high jumper George Kirby was eliminated. Kirby, who cleared 6-2 in the Valley meet, tied for second but was ousted because he had the most misses. Hurdles and broad jump possibility Ed Carr failed to qualify for the lows' final, tripped and fell in the highs and managed only fifth in the broad jump.

Carl Krieger of Central watched Valley 880 champ Connie Conner fade to fifth place and Bill Lee, who pole vaulted 12 feet last Tuesday went out at 10 feet.

Southwestern's George LeBrasseur stacked quartermilers in the mile relay but they finished fifth. Miller Tom Florida, second in the Valley, missed third place by a yard.

HOWDY LOOMIS' Ainsworth star, Hillery Clifford, hit a low hurdle just as he was making his move and finished fourth. Half-miler Steve Gosnell ran outside most of the way and was out of the money in sixth place.

Barnett and Washington retained regional titles. While Saturday's winning efforts were poorer than last year's records, they could be excused. Rain turned the jumping areas to quagmires (at one point the broad jump takeoff board was floating) and water stood three inches deep on parts of the track.

Monroe's Larry Page, who lowered the 440 record to 50.7, also retained a title as did Jackson pole vaulters Alan Lauer and Sam Williams who shared first at 11-6.

## Bunning Is Homer-Hitting Fireman

### Stops Indian Threat, Starts Tiger Spurt

CLEVELAND (AP) — Detroit's Jim Bunning turned in a neat relief job and smacked a home run as the Tigers beat the Cleveland Indians 9-3 Saturday.

Bunning, who replaced starter Don Mossi in the eighth inning with one out, protected Detroit's 4-3 lead by striking out the next two men and retiring five in a row.

The Tigers broke open a tight game in the ninth with a five-run rally highlighted by Bunning's solo blast off reliever Frank Funk, the third Cleveland hurler. Four of the runs were unearned as the

Indians made four errors in the ninth.

Mossi (3-4), the winner, had allowed only one Cleveland run and five hits until Chuck Essegian and Gene Green hit back-to-back homers with none on in the eighth. Mossi fanned seven and walked one.

Chico Fernandez singled twice and homered to knock in two Detroit runs.

Detroit took a 3-0 lead in the first off loser Jim Perry (2-1). Bill Bruton doubled home Fernandez, who opened with a single. Norm Cash singled and scored Bruton. Cash moved around on

Rocky Colavito's single and Perry's balk.

Fernandez' third homer of the season in the second off Perry gave Detroit a 4-0 lead.

Cleveland got its first tally off Mossi in the third on a walk and singles by Tito Francona and Green, who knocked in two Tribe runs.

Tiger Manager Bob Scheffing has picked Frank Lary (1-2) and Phil Regan (3-2) for today's double-header. They'll face Pedro Ramos (0-1) and Sam McDowell (2-2).
