

Dorie Reid Misses Meet; Seaholm Posts No. 51

Seaholm High's track team escaped a real scare May 22.

A muscle injury to Ferndale's flashy Dorie Reid enabled the Maples to gain their 51st straight Eastern Michigan League dual meet triumph. The Maples totaled 57½ points to Ferndale's 51½.

Since 1953 the Maples have lost only two non-conference meets, one to Cranbrook School.

REID, THE state's Class A top dashman, pulled a hamstring muscle in the state regionals at Redford May 19 and missed the competition.

He scored 16¼ points and could have been the big difference against Seaholm.

Reid, who weighs 158 pounds, won the 100 in :9.6 seconds, bettering the official state record of :9.8. The pulled muscle slowed him down in the 220 but he won the final in :22.1. He leaped 22 feet, 2½ inches to win the broad jump and stormed from five yards back on the last lap to run away with the 880 relay in 1:39.4 at the regionals.

IF HE WOULD have competed against the Maples, he probably would have won the three events and the long-winning streak would have come to an abrupt halt.

However, Coach Kermit Ambrose's squad powered seven firsts, including a slam in the shot put—

THE FOURSOME of Richard Bagley, who won the 100, Bob Parrish, Neil Satovsky and John Swain, who won the pole vault, posted a new record for the mile relay in 3:50.9. The old mark of 3:03.4 was set last year.

plus five seconds to accomplish the victory.

In addition, Bob Drothler won the 220, took a second in the 100, a third in the broad jump and the second runner on the winning 880 relay team to pace the attack with 10¼ points.

PACED BY Jack Harvey, the Maples swept the shot put. Harvey put the shot 51 feet nine inches. Gage Cooper and Jim Knowles placed second and third, respectively.

Carter Dinkeloo copped the 120 yard high hurdles and grabbed a second in the lows. Jim Daniels Drothler, Bruce Bates 100 winner, and Ray Johnson, 440 dash winner, carried the baton to a winning 880-relay clocking of 1:32.9.
