Records fell by the wayside Saturday as four new class champions were named in Michigan high school track.

Tiny Louis Scott of Detroit Eastern raced to a new Michigan area mile record in class A competition at Ann Arbor but Grosse Pointe and Muskegon Heights shared the old schools crown when they deadlocked with 30 points apiece.

At East Lansing, long-dormant Dowagiac was only one event but placed in enough other events to win the class B title for the first time since 1934.

And at Mount Pleasant, Lansing St. Mary won the class C title and Michigan School for the Deaf won its second straight class D championship in day-long competition at Central Michigan University.

The 5-6 Scott used a tremendous kick in the home stretch to win by 10 feet over favored Dick Sharkey of Detroit Redford. His time of 4:17.4 bettered the old class A mark of 4:21.3 set in 1958 by Pennington Purdy of Grosse Pointe.

Grosse Pointe and Muskegon Heights each placed in the mile relay, the final event of the day, to surpass defending champion Flint Northern at the University of Michigan's Ferry Field. Northern finished close with 27 points and Detroit Eastern was next with 20.

The titles were the first in history for the Pointes and the Heights.

Monroe's Larry Page equalled the class A record in the 440 yard dash when he raced home in :49.7 to tie the 1955 mark to William Campbell of Dearborn Fordson. Dowagiac's only winner was Mose Easley in the 220 yard dash. The championship was the first for coach Paul Watt, a 1961 graduate of Hope College at Holland.

Three new state records were set in class B competition at Michigan State University. Eric Zemper of Howell won the mile in 4:22.3 to break the old mark of 4:25.5 set by Gordon Morey of Clio in 1961.

Mike Martin of Charlotte won the 880 yard run in record-breaking time. His clocking of 1:56.1 bettered the long-standing mark of Quentin Brelstor of Birmingham high school set back in 1938.

Gary Rugg of Battle Creek Pennfield broke the only other class B

mark in the shot put when he tossed 55 feet 8 1/2 inches to eclipse the old record of 54 feet 8 1/2 inches by Earl Glenn of Belleville in 1952.

Egorse followed Dowagiac in team scoring with 35 3/6 points. River Rouge was third and then it was Stevensville-Lakeshore, Oksego, Detroit Lutheran West (the 1961 champion), Chelsea, Flint Denile and Big Rapids.

Chuck Washington of Centreville won the class C high jump to establish the only new mark in C competition at Mount Pleasant. Washington leaped 6 feet 2 3/4 inches to eclipse the old mark of 5 feet 1 1/2 inches set in 1958 by Steve Williams of Boyne City.

Lansing St. Mary finished three points ahead of the Boys Training School of Lansing to win the C crown.

East Jackson was third, mainly because of Dave Loomis' two victories in the 120 yard dash and the 220 yard dash. East Jackson finished with 25 points.

The C meet's only other double winner was Roger Davison of Deekerville. He took the 120 yard high hurdles and the 180 yard low hurdles.

Gary Tesman of Centreville won the pole vault, he won the same event in class B last year but his school went into the lower classification this year.

The class D title which the School for the Deaf won was its fifth championship in 16 years. But they needed a victory in the last event of the day to turn the tide.

There was a three-event winner in the small schools' competition as Dave Wood of Wolverine grabbed crowns in the 180 low hurdles, the 120 high hurdles and the shot put.

Chet Bessley of Ypsilanti St. John's won two class D events in the 220 and 180 yard dashes.

Don Smith of the Deaf won the broad jump with a record leap of 21 feet 5 inches. The Deaf boys broke their own record in the mile relay with a time of 3:33.4 to break their 1961 mark of 3:37.4.

Covers' finished second with seven points behind the School for the Deaf. Other teams finishing high were Martin, Wolverine, Ypsilanti St. John's, Mason County Eastern, Unionville, Mio and Grosse Pointe University High.
