

Four Local Teams Ready for Track Carnival

The area's biggest track and field carnival—the third annual All Oakland County Meet — is loaded with star-studded performers.

The all county attraction is a natural headliner. The preliminaries begin at 3 p.m. Saturday with the finals set for 8 p.m. at Southfield High School, Ten Mile and Lahser Road.

FOUR LOCAL track powers—

Seaholm, Bloomfield Hills, Brother Rice and Groves—have accepted invitations to the meet, which is expected to attract nearly 30 schools throughout the county.

Probably the biggest disappointment is Cranbrook School's decision not to compete in the meet. The squad members took a vote May 22 and decided not to participate because of the final exams scheduled for Monday.

THE COMPETING schools will be shooting for one of the team trophies awarded to the five top

teams. Individuals will vie for medals awarded to the first six places in each event.

Waterford won the team title in 1960 and Pontiac Central copped the honors last year.

Three records might fall as the field attempts to better marks established in the 13 events.

Dorie Reid, Ferndale speedy dashman, is expected to lower his 100-yard dash mark of :10.0 set in 1960. Already he has been clocked in :9.6 for the century.

Reid should smash the 220 mark of :22.0 set last year. He ran the

220 in :22.1 in the regionals with a pulled leg muscle.

SEAHOLM'S 880-YARD relay record time of 1:31.5 could be shattered by Bloomfield Hills' speedy foursome of John Schweppe, Fritz Stresen-Reuter, Dave Noyes and Roger Stewart. This quartet already has posted a record 1:31.7 at the Central Michigan University Relays.

The local hopes will be riding with Seaholm and Bloomfield Hills. Both teams sport a talented line-up which could give Pontiac

Central, pre-meet favorite, some anxious and troublesome moments.

THE MAPLES are perennial rulers of the Eastern Michigan League. They have won the league crown nine straight years and will attempt to make it ten in a row Tuesday at Hazel Park.

Coach Don Hoff's Barons should give added prestige to the local area. The Barons successfully defended their Wayne - Oakland County track title May 22.

The Maples have a corps of three shotputters — Jack Harvey, Gage

Cooper and Jim Knowles. The Barons have Bill Calhoun, in his first year as a weightman. Groves will enter sophomore Neil Granader.

THE HURDLES events should provide some added excitement with Art Tregenza and Ted Barnett, of Bloomfield Hills, Carter Dinkeloo, of Seaholm, and Bob Vibbert, of Groves.

The 100 and 220 dashes should be the sole-property of Ferndale's Reid. However, Bloomfield Hills

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has speedy John Schweppe and Seaholm can counter with Jim Daniels and Bob Drothler. Groves will have senior Art Schueler in the blocks. Joe Schur will represent Brother Rice.

The Barons' Noyes and Seaholm's Ray Jobson should provide a splendid duel in the 440 yard run, with Noyes holding a definite edge.

SEAHOLM WILL have Daniels, Drothler, Bruce Bates and Jobson set to go in the 880 relay and John Derrick, Kim Bateman, John Strang and Mike Geer in the mile relay.

The mile could develop into a duel between Seaholm's Jack Bachelor, who owns a 4:34.4 time as his best, and Brother Rice's Norm Koltys and Bob Smith of Bloomfield Hills.

Bob Richards of Bloomfield Hills and Seaholm's Geer and John Collins will supply a race in the 880.

The field events — high jump, broad jump and pole vault — appear to be the weak events of the local clubs.

GROVES' Scheuler is only broad jumper to eclipse the 20-foot measure this year.

Seaholm's Ken Heft and Bloomfield Hills' Bruce Bish look like the lone performers in the pole vault. Seaholm's Roger Mason, holder of the pole vault mark at 11'11 $\frac{1}{4}$ ", fractured his collarbone early in the campaign and has been sidelined since.

TREGENZA will be entered in the high and broad jumps.

Detroit Country Day School will send miler John Swain, a freshman who qualified for the state Class D finals, and Neil Satovsky, top half-miler.
