

Shils' Rochow Sets School Track Mark

MOUNT PLEASANT — Pickford's overwhelming depth, River Rouge's late comeback and Dave Wood's individual prowess featured the Central Michigan Relays yesterday.

Pickford, taking first places in six of the 16 events, captured the Class D crown by 26 points over defending champion Michigan School for the Deaf. River Rouge, with its only three first places coming in the final three running events, nipped Birmingham Cranbrook by less than six points for the Class B crown.

Woods, who led Wolverine to fourth place in Class D, was the only triple winner in the first of the two-day competition.

Woods captured the 120-yard high hurdles in meet record time of :15.6, set another meet standard in winning the 180-yard low hurdles in :20.5 and topped off his victories with a 49'4" toss in the shotput.

The Class A and C championships will be held today. Qualifying events will start at 9:30 a.m. More than 2,900 athletes from 180 schools were expected to compete in the two-day classic, largest of its kind in the nation

In Class D, Bay City St. Mary's Chuck Rochow took a first place in one event and performed well enough in three others to break records standing at his school.

He won the broad jump with a leap of 20'7½" and, although second in a two-man duel with Pickford's Tom Harrison in the pole vault, managed to break his school mark of 11'6". Harrison won the event with 11'8½".

Rochow was fifth in the 120-yard high hurdles with St. Mary's Walter Graveline taking fifth place in the 100-yard dash. Clare Pearsall of Fairview was second, Ron Brinkman of Hale third, and John Fry of Unionville fourth in both the 120-yard high hurdles and the 180-yard low hurdles. Pearsall also took a fourth place in the broad jump.

George Byelich of Mio won the mile run with a time of 4:47.6 and the Un-

ionville shuttle relay team of Schuch, Oterson, Roller, and Fry won their event with a 1:04.7 clocking.

Wolverine's middle distance relay team placed third with Unionville and Owengage respectively, in the 440-yard relaying second and third relay.
