

Sexton Takes CMU Relays

Montrose Tops Big Field for Class C

MOUNT PLEASANT — Lansing Sexton and Montrose carried off Class A and C crowns Saturday in the Central Michigan University Relays for Michigan high schools.

Sexton rolled up 63 1/4 points to Detroit Thurston's 48. East Lansing was third with 45, and Hazel Park fourth with 41 1/4.

Montrose tallied 40 points to win its title. The Boys Training School of Lansing was second with 35. Montague's 34 points were good for third and Lansing St. Marys and Battle Creek St. Phillip finished fourth and fifth respectively.

Bob Kanaga of Harbor Beach placed in two events, taking a second in the broad jump and a third in the 100-yard dash in Class C.

Larry Winter of Sebewaing was second in that event with his school coming through fourth in the 880-yard relay. Akron-Fairgrove was fifth in the latter event and tied with Baldwin and Muskegon Reeths-Puffer for third place in the 440-yard relay.

Jerry Richards won the 180-yard low hurdles with a time of :20.4. Skip Kegg of Clare was third in the mile run with Dale Scofield taking fourth place in the broad jump for Farwell, which was fourth and Evart fifth in the Central relays behind Lansing St. Mary's 1:10.4 winning time.

A total of six new marks were established, two in Class A and four in Class C, as the two-day track carnival involving more than 2,774 athletes from 168 Michigan high schools closed.

Others compiling more than 20 points were Birmingham Seaholm, 31; Bloomfield Hills, 28, and Mt. Pleasant, 22 1/4. Ypsilanti had 13 and Royal Oak Kimball and Farmington finished in a ninth-place tie with 10 apiece.

Following in Class C were Muskegon Reeths-Puffer sixth with 20 3/10; and Merrill and Jackson St. Mary tied for seventh with 14 apiece.

Others in order were Hart, 13; Carson City, 12 2/5; Ypsilanti Roosevelt, 12; Kent City 9, and a three-way-tie between Deckerville, North Branch and Sebewaing, each with 8.

INDIANAPOLIS—(AP)—Parnelli Jones continued his drive to turn the first 150-mile-an-hour lap at the Indianapolis Speedway Saturday with an unofficial timing of 149.7, best ever recorded here.

The stopwatch clocking, however, won't go into the books because the Speedway's electronic timer wasn't in use. Jim Hurtubise of Lennox, Calif., set the official standard in qualifications two years ago in 149.601.

The 28-year-old Torrance, Calif., driver set his unofficial mark in his Agajanian Special moments before the first serious accident since the track opened a week ago for practice.

Jimmy Daywalt, 37-year-old veteran driver from Indianapolis, lost control coming out of the southwest turn and skidded broadside about 600 feet before hitting the wall tail first.

Bill Laskey, 195-pound freshman halfback from Milan, injured a shoulder that may keep him out of next week's annual spring game.

Veteran Jim Ward, right halfback, scored the first Blue touchdown on a one-yard plunge after he had raced 17 yards to the four-yard line. Bruce McLenna, fullback, plunged four yards for the second score and Bill Dodd, also a fullback, added no. 3 with a five-yard smash.

Frosty Evashevski, after missing last week's game because of injuries, returned to score the fourth touchdown on a 25-yard fake pass.

Dick Rindfuss, of Niles, Ohio, racked up the fifth on a three-

quarterback, saw his first action of the spring season and completed several passes.
