

## Whitaker Tops Jones' Record

# Northern Retains Huron Relays Title

YPSILANTI — Defending champion Flint Northern edged Pontiac Central for the Class A Huron Relays championship at Flint Southwestern's Bill Whitaker broke Hayes Jones' broad jump record Saturday night at Bowen Field House.

Northern finished with 28 points, Pontiac Central had 26, Ann Arbor 17, Flint Central 15 and Birmingham Seaholm 14. Southwestern finished with six points.

DALTON KIMBALL in the 60-yard dash (6.5 seconds), Al Washington in the high jump (6-3) and Frank Cause, Andy Johnson, Rozeal Graves and Cliff Finklea in the mile relay (3:37.9) captured first places for Northern. Central (Bruce Loyd, Sherm Wallace, Neal Patterson and Marion Hoey) finished ahead of Northern in the mile relay in 3:35.5, but was disqualified because Wallace was declared an ineligible runner in that event.

Northern Coach Norb Badar said the Vikings' third place in the 880 relay with Wilbur Johnson, Eugene Byrd, Tom Robinson and Willie Buck in 1:36.8 picked up key points.

"The first three were running their first varsity meet and I really wasn't counting on them to place," said Badar.

Northern picked up other points with a fifth in the sprint medley relay (Ralph Avery, Johnson, Buck and Finklea in 2:38.9).

SOUTHWESTERN'S Whitaker leaped 22 feet, 3 inches to erase the record of 21-3 by Jones when he competed for Pontiac Central

in 1956. The Colts' only other placer was Tom Florida, fifth in the mile in 4:39.4. Sarnia's Keith Coates set a record 4:25.3 in the event.

Central picked up points with a fifth in the two-mile relay (Barry Potter, Tiny Laster, Bob Leslie and Neal Patterson in 8:31.9), Marion Hoey's third in the 60 dash, a second place by its shuttle hurdle relay team (Lavern Turner, Ernie Long, Jewell Baxter and

Marv Mabry in 29.6 seconds) and a fourth by Turner in the 65 low hurdles.

Pontiac Central's shuttle hurdle relay team was clocked in 28.9 in the preliminaries, which broke Northern's 1957 record of 29.0.

Worthington, Ohio, won the two-mile relay in 8:25.6, Steve Leuchtmann of Detroit Thurston the shot with a 55-5/4 heave, Henry Patrino of Lansing Everett the 65 high hurdles in 8.3 seconds, Grosse Pointe the sprint medley relay in 2:35.5, Birmingham Seaholm the 880 relay in 1:36.4, Daswell Campbell the 15 low hurdles in 7.0 and John Stewart of Pontiac Central the pole vault in 12-6.

Some 1,200 athletes from 60 schools in Michigan, Ohio and Ontario competed in Saturday night's events. Some 600 more were entered in Friday night's Huron Relays for Class B, C and D high schools. River Rouge took the Class B Huron Relays title.

## Leafs' Bower Sparkles In 2-0 Playoff Victory

MONTREAL (AP) — Veteran goalie Johnny Bower turned in the first Stanley Cup playoff shutout of his long career Saturday night and helped Toronto to a 2-0 victory over Montreal, giving the Maple Leafs a whopping 3-0 lead in their best-of-7 semifinal set.

The fourth game will be played in Montreal Tuesday, with the fifth game, if necessary, in Toronto Thursday.

Bower, 38, who had appeared in 38 previous playoff games, was forced to make 32 saves en route to the blanking of the troubled

Fiery Eddie Shack gave the Leafs all the room they needed with a goal at 13 minutes and 14 seconds of the middle period, with an assist going to Bob Pulford.

Pulford, a center just one day short of his 27th birthday, made a nice pass to set up Shack, then put it out of reach with his second playoff goal, an unassisted effort late in the final period.
