

# Boost Warwick Facilities To Handle 43,000 Fans

Warwick Hills is being geared to handle more than 40,000 fans at the sixth annual Buick Open Golf Tournament on June 6-9.

Tournament Chairman Stan Plummer explained Saturday that parking facilities at the spacious Grand Blanc layout are being expanded by 30 per cent.

On the basis of an announced attendance of 32,892 last year, it means facilities are being prepared to handle approximately 43,000 fans.

PLUMMER EXPLAINED that

the south lot is being enlarged and two new lots have been opened near Burning Tree Drive. Although some parking space was lost to new buildings, the new areas more than make up for the loss.

The tourney chairman said that the south lot is the one which will handle most of the traffic from Wayne, Oakland and Macomb counties. Because the Buick Open is the only major golf tournament to be played in Michigan this year, Warwick Hills officials

are planning on bigger crowds from the Detroit area.

The announced entry of Jack Nicklaus, Arnold Palmer and Gary Player should add to the interest. General Chairman Jerry Rideout said Saturday that Mark McCormack, Palmer's personal manager, said there's a 99 per cent probability of Palmer being here despite his recent withdrawal from the tour for a rest.

**INCREASED ACTIVITY** by Advance Ticket Chairman Harold Johnson's committee should add to the crowd. Where there were five ticket outlets last year in Detroit, this year there are 33. Saginaw outlets have been increased from two last year to 18 this year. Lansing outlets have been boosted from two to eight. Moreover, every Buick dealer in the state has tickets.

There are more than 150 outlets in Genesee County, Johnson said. Included are all General Motors plants, all golf course pro shops and many retail stores.

Johnson reminded fans of the \$1 price for advance purchase and the \$2 price if tickets are bought at the gate. The ticket deadline is June 2. Free parking is included in the price.—HOYES

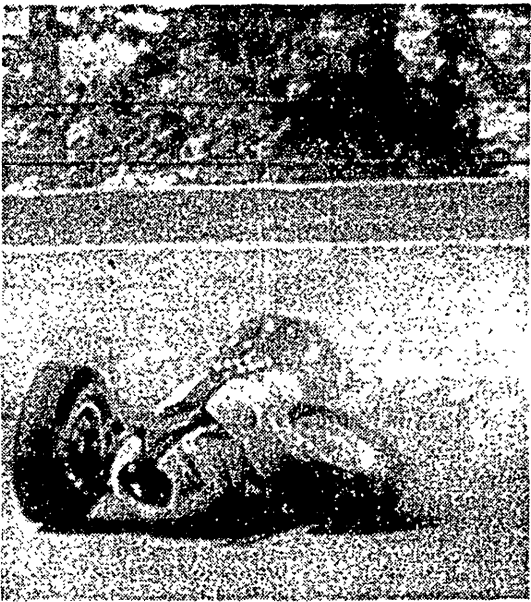
# Chips in Split; Muntin Loses
