UNIONVILLE'S FRY BREAKS TWO RECORDS

Capac's 880 Relay Team State King

Capac High's 880-yard relay team won one of three firsts scored by Blue Water Area athletes in the state Class A, B, C and D track finals Saturday in meets held at three centers.

Capac's quartet of Ken Adamski, John Ceranski, Louie Bernard and John Stanilou captured the first place trophy in Class C finals at Central Michigan University, Mt. Pleasant. John Fry, Unionville High's

exceptional hurdler, won both the highs and lows in Class D at Central Michigan University. He set records in both events. Fry ran the lows in :20.3 in preliminary competition breaking the record of :20.5 set by David Woods of Wolverine in 1960. In the highs his :15.3 clocking cracked Woods 1962 mark of :15.5.

PORT HURON HIGH'S nine-man squad picked up seven points in the Class A finals at Michigan State University. Larry Butler placed fourth in the low hurdles and seventh in the highs and John Bivins placed sixth in the broad jump. Dwight Lee, New Haven High junior, placed second in the Class C broad jump.

Mike May of Vassar picked up the only other second place finish, when he finished behind Dan Greene of Tecumseh in the Class B pole vault at University at Michigan's Ferry Field.

In addition to running on the winning Class C 880-yard relay team, Adamski placed fourth in the high jump and sixth in the century.

FLINT NORTHERN won the Class A team championship with 37½ points, followed by Flint Central with 32 points, as nine records were broken and another tied.

Probably the best times in the frenzy of record-setting were the winning mile of 4:13.2 by Lou Scott of Detroit Eastern and the flashy 880 time of 1:53.3 by Walt Wilson of Inkster Robichaud. Both were reported as the best outdoor high school times for the distance in the country so far this year.

Led by basketball star Willie Betts, River Rouge piled up 52 points on the University of Michigan's Ferry Field to double the 26-point output of second-place East Grand Rapids in winning Class B honors.

Defending champion Dowagiac faded to a third place tie with Vassar at 20 points.

Boys Training School of Lansing won the state Class C without winning a single event.
