# Even Day Off Is 'Hurdle' for Jones

Six weeks on the road with track meets all over Europe is enough travel and enough running. So what does Hayes Jones do when he gets home? He goes on another trip and runs in another track meet.

But the trip this time was to Canada with his left-at-home wife and children. Anybody can understand where the pressure for that came from.

And the track meet was the annual Michigan AAU championships, held in Detroit Saturday for the first time in 15 years.

IT IS A testimonial to the personal class of Jones, the world's finest high hurdler, that he was on the premises at U-D Stadium at all.

Here was an Olympic medal winner and veteran of the protracted Russian dual meets, with more than his summer's quota of running, in a rather casual meet.

It was the kind of meet where the 44-yard hurdles race had only two entries so only two lanes of barriers were raised; then, when the event was announced, five more contenders came out of the grass and they had to add hurdles and even run two heats.

There was a runner in a sweatshirt that said Northwest a farm kid just out of high school in Greentfield, Ind., who went in four events—barefoot in some of them—and won two.

BUT HAYES JONES was there, turning much of the crowd of several hundred and just nipping Wayne State's Paul Jones in the high hurdles.

He was there because every little bit might help Detroit land the 1968 Olympics and because track needs some boosting in these parts anyway.

High school tracks and equipment are under lock and key during the summer, the track on Belle Isle isn't the best, and U-D's track isn't really finely manicured.

"But you will see a cycle of meets around here now," Hayes said. "The interest is there. Detroit just has to start building."

HIS OWN TRACK cycle meanwhile, will run through the 1964 Olympics, with a little financial pinch along the way.

A schoolteacher, Jones isn't on the regular Detroit list right now after all his travel. And working as a sub isn't as good on payday.

He's hoping to find something in public relations as a long-range goal, coach some girls' track teams along the way.

As a public relations starter, there is the Olympics to talk about.

## Citizen's Wins 2 in Tourney

YOUNGSTOWN, O.— Detroit, trying to win a sixth straight National Amateur Baseball Federation Class IV title, got away to a great start here Saturday.

Citizen's Mutual, the Motor City representative, swept an opening day doubleheader edgeing Cleveland, 1-0, behind Bill Zepp's three-hit pitching and hammering Baltimore, 11-1, with Keith Spicer hitting a grand slam homer in a six-run sixth inning.

Sunday Citizen's will meet the winner of the Pittsburgh-Youngstown game in the third round of this double elimination meet.

Zepp, the right-hander from Redford High who will enroll next month at the University of Michigan, out-dueled Cleveland's Jim Rittwage. Citizen's got only three hits off Rittwage. Zepp allowed only five baserunners in the entire nine innings.
