

## CC Runs To Victory In Relays

Track Balance Decisive in Mud

Rain, mud and wind—these were the elements the schoolboys had to battle Saturday in track and field competition throughout the Detroit area.

In the day's biggest attraction Catholic Central captured only two of 14 first places but piled up 53½ points to win the Brother Rice Relays.

Hurdler Frank Haggerty, one of the state's better performers in his specialty, turned in a fine 10.5 performance in the 120-yard high hurdles, and high jumper Bill Davis won his event with a mediocre effort of five feet, 10 inches.

FARMINGTON finished fourth but managed to win three events, the distance medley, mile relay and sprint medley relays.

John Holder of Troy won the broad jump with a leap of 21 feet 3 inches and Walled Lake's Steve Pitcher captured the pole vault at 12 feet.

Following Catholic Central in the team scoring were U-D High 49 1/3, Birmingham Groves 48 1/3, Farmington 45, Brother Rice 31, DeLaSalle 24, Austin 18 1/3, Walled Lake 15 1/3, Berkley 9, Troy 8, Clawson 8 and Notre Dame 7.

Dave Garber won three field events, the pole vault, high jump and broad jump, to lead St. Patrick, of Wyandotte, to a 72-36 dual meet victory over St. Alphonsus.

Bob Pilarski, of Roseville Sacred Heart won the high jump, high hurdles and low hurdles besides running a relay leg in leading his team to an 88-21 victory over Dearborn Sacred Heart.
