# Ann Arbor Wins 'A' Relays Title

It was a Six-A League battle down to the wire at Jenison Fieldhouse Saturday night as Ann Arbor defeated Sexton for the team title at the State Journal-Spartan High School Relays.

The Pioneers shaded the Big Reds, 25-16, by taking a first and a second in the last two events.

With two events to go, any

one of nine schools could have won the team championship but the Pioneers pulled it out before a crowd of 3,011 when Ken Dyer won the high jump and the mile relay team finished second.

Pre-meet favorite Birmingham Seaholm and Romulus tied for third with 12 points apiece while there was a four-way tie for fifth. Howell, Bloomfield Hills, Mt. Clemens

and Roseville each scored 10 points.

Everett was considered a prime contender for the team title until hurdler Henry Patino suffered a knee injury in the afternoon preliminaries. The Viking finished with 8½ points.

Besides winning the high jump, Ann Arbor's Dyer emerged as one of the meet's top individuals by also running the anchor leg on the win-

ning shuttle hurdles relay team and placing fifth in the 70-yard high hurdles.

Bill Bailey gave the Pioneers another first with his victory in the 70-yard low hurdles and Ann Arbor picked up its other points with a second in sprint medley relay and a fifth in the two-mile relay.

Sexton was a contender until the shuttle hurdles relay when the Pioneers barely edged the Big Reds. Prior to

that, Sexton got all time best performances from Willie McKissic and Lindsey Henderson. McKissic set a personal best when he ran :06.4 in the semi-final heat of the 60-yard dash. He repeated that time in the final for Sexton's first victory of the night.

Shortly after that, Henderson came up with a personal best by leaping 22 feet, 7½ inches for a first in the broad jump. Sexton's other points came in

the final event, the mile relay, when the team of Ron Jean, George Barnett, Rick Shannon and Henderson placed fourth.

Even though Patino was forced to scratch from the meet, he still got credit for a meet record. Before withdrawing, Patino ran a fast :08.2 in his heat of the 70-yard low hurdles, a time that wasn't bettered or equaled for the rest of the meet. Bailey ran :08.3 in taking the final.

Patino was a key man on the Vikings' 880-yard relay team

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but as it turned out they didn't need him. Everett won anyhow in a fast 1:34.7 with the team of Russ Barnes, Rich Ryals, Les Koven and Tom Smith.

The Vikings' Jim Pearce placed third in the high jump with a leap of 6 feet, 3 inches, a personal best and the best leap ever made by a city high school boy. The Vikings' sophomore Duane Wells also set a personal best when he tied for fourth in the pole vault by clearing 12 feet, 2 inches.

Sharing individual honors with Dyer was pole vaulter Jim Haviland of Waterford Kettering, a junior whose mark of 13 feet, 6 inches, was one of the best ever made by a state high school boy.

Howell pulled two major upsets. In the afternoon the Highlanders upset Birmingham Seaholm in the two-mile relay with a fast 8:14.5. Steve Zemper opened with a 2:01.9 half mile and Rick Dunn finished with a 2:01.5 to pace Howell. Other team members were Jim Chapman and John Miller.

The same foursome returned at night to win the mile relay in a fast 3:32.3. Dunn contributed a :31.0 anchor leg.

Another outstanding performance was turned in when Doug Montgomery of Romulus won the 70-yard high hurdles in :08.6 one of the best times ever posted by a high school athlete.

## Spartan Relays Notes

### Betts, Stewart Alter Roles; Patino Out

Two opponents in the final game of the Class B state basketball tournament had opposite fortunes in Friday's Class B meet at The State Journal-Spartan High School Relays.

For Willie Betts of River Rouge the day was filled with disappointment as he was upset by Willow Run's Lamar Miller in both hurdle races. But for Jim Stewart of Lakeview, how-

ever, it was a surprising day as he won the pole vault.

In that state basketball final which Rouge won, 86-67, Betts scored 21 points while Stewart had 18.

Betts, who won both hurdles in the Class B state meet last year, started training for track less than two weeks ago but he had a stiff workout Friday, running a total of eight races.

Betts, who won a gold medal by anchoring the winning shuttle hurdles relay team, showed that he knew how to lose although the experience is pretty new to him.

"I have no excuses for what happened tonight," he said after the meet. "He just beat me. I can take defeat."

Like Betts, Stewart had been training for only a short time

but he looked impressive in the pole vault, winning at 12 feet, 7¼ inches and making a good attempt at 13 feet. Besides his vaulting, Stewart also was fourth in the low hurdles.

One of the outstanding athletes in either the Class B or the Class A section of the meet was Miller, a 5-10 senior whose father is the Flyers' coach.

Miller placed fourth in the high hurdles and second in the 220-yard dash at last year's state meet but looked like he would improve on that performance this year with his strong showing Friday.

He won both hurdles in fast time, took third in the broad jump and ran on the third-place
