If Friday's Class B results are any indication, outstanding performances will be the rule rather than the exception

The Class A portion opened in Michigan State's Jenison Fieldhouse this aftermoon with finals in the two-mile relay, shot put and pole vault plus most preliminaries. The rest of the finals will be held tonight, starting at 6 p.m.

Admission at the gate is \$1 for adults and 50 cents for any student.

The meet opened Friday before a crowd of 2,000 and the Class B schools produced results that were not expected so early in the season. As a rule, most of the winning

marks were excellent and the Class A athletes will have to do some fast stepping to better them today.

As expected, River Rouge won the Class B title handily but unexpectedly, the Panthers' Willie Betts failed to win the burdles. in the hurdles

Betts was upset by Willow Run's Lamar Miller, who wound up as the meet's out-standing Class B athlete by

capturing both hurdles in addition to placing third in the broad imp.

Betts, however, did pick up a gold medal when he anchored River Rouge to a first place in the shuttle hurdle relay. The Panthers also won the 800-yard relay and the broad imp but picked up most of their points with five second places.
