## **Battle Creek Central Wins**

## Indians 'Thin,' Second **Track**

ANN ARBOR—A suspicion that Flint Central left its state track title hopes in last week's regional was verified here Sat-

The Indians were just too manpower thin and had to settle for runner-up honors in the main event as Battle Creek Central collected 28 points to Flint's 26 and won its first Class A title in the 39-year history of the Michigan High School Athletic

Coach Carl Krieger's last chance to win evaporated when a makeshift mile relay team finished fourth in its heat and didn't

FLINT SOUTHWESTERN scored 19 points and tied for 10th place. Davison got three points and tied for 38th place while Flint Northern, Clio and Grand Blanc went scoreless. Fortyeight teams got a least one point.

The third Class A meet not won by the Saginaw Valley Conference in the last 21 years helped create three Flint area

• Flint teams failed to get a first place for the first time since 1939. This span includes 1943 when there was no state meet and 1944 when a school strike prevented Central and Northern from entering the regional to qualify.

 Northern, which was defending champ and had two titles. seven seconds and one third place in the last 10 years, was

shut out for the first time since 1939.

 Davison, Via Dale Kutchey's fifth place in the pole vault, became the first Big Nine Conference team-except Owossoto score in the Class A meet.

Battle Creek had all its points with four events remaining and scored everything in the hurdles and dashes, including the 880 relay.

THE CHAMPIONSHIP was contained in a duel between Battle Creek's Arnie Williams and Central's Bob Cooper in the 100 and 220-yard dashes. Williams won both-he was one of the day's two double winners-while Cooper was second in the 220 and third in the century.

Central's second straight runner-up finish certainly wasn't Cooper's fault. He scored 11 points in individual events and added 11/4 points as the anchor leg of the Tribe's SSO relay team which placed third. Cooper got the baton four yards behind the leader and was beaten by an eyelash by Lansing Evertt. Detroit Central, a heat winner earlier, slipped into second place.

"I still remember him as one of the greatest punters I've ever seen," Houston explains.



The Indians also got an extraordinary effort from high jumper Leroy Blassingame who cleared 6.5% for second place. Until Saturday he hadn't done better than 6.4 and his top effort broke the meet record of 6-5 set in 1963 by Northern High's Al

Southwestern's William Crawford also broke Washington's mark but was relegated to third place because he missed more times than Blassingame.

BOTH FLINT MEN WERE deprived of a spot in the record book by Ann Arbor's Ken Dyer who cleared 6-734 for one of two accepted records of the day. Dyer made every height on his first attempt until all others had been eliminated, then missed three straight times trying for 6-8%.

Central's Mac Henry Johnson was fifth in the high jump. Thus, Central got nine points in one event, the day's biggest splurge until Saginaw Arthur Hill picked up 11 points in the pole vault, long after everyone except a handful of die-hards had gone home.

Tribe Registers 26 Points

Central got one point from Mel Summers' seventh place in the shot put.

Lew Patton, George Hoey and Lacey Jones ran on Central's 880 relay team while Crawford, Jim Broden, Larry Davis and Cecil Fowler formed Southwestern's mile relay crew. Each earned five points.

THE ONLY OTHER accepted record went to Arthur Hill's Wayne Lambert whose 13-1134 pole vault erased the mark of 13-6 set last year by Flint Central's Bill Lee. A half hour after the last running event had been completed, three vaulters remained and it took another hour before Lambert emerged with the triumph. Flint's Cooper was one of four outstanding individuals. In addition to Williams' 14 points, teammate Rich Speights

picked up 12 with seconds in both hurdles and they formed half of Battle Creek's sixth-place 880 relay team where two points provided the victory margin. Lansing Everett's Henry Patino won both hurdles and

helped the winning 880 relay team for 1534 points. He cracked meet records in the hurdles but wind offset them.

Everett, winner of last week's Flint area regional, was third Saturday with 21 points. Then came Ecorse with 19, Detroit Central 15, Birmingham Seaholm 14, Lansing Sexton. Arthur Hill and Mount Clemens with 11 each, and Bloomfield Hills, and Southwestern with 10.

Pontiac Central had 61/2, Saginaw High 6 points and Midland 5 points as other Valley representatives.
