Francie Kraker Runs 880 In 2:17.4:

City Girl Sets AAU Record

HANFORD, Calif. — The track and field world will be hearing a lot more about Ann Arbor's Francie Kraker and Livonia's Louise Gerrish, both members of the Ann Arbor Anns.

The two girls are becoming fairly well known in women's track circles in this nation and it is expected that they will go on to gain world-wide recognition.

Miss Kraker, 17, captured another hunk of the spotlight at the National Women's AAU meet last night when she came up in the final stretch to win the girls' division (17-and-under) 880-yard run. Her winning time of 2:17.4 broke the American girls' record she had set the night before by two and one-tenth seconds. Meanwhile, Miss Gerrish, 15, placed third in the girls' javelin event with a toss of 144 feet, 8 1/2 inches. Tonight she will compete in the women's division. The event was won by Lurline Hamilton

who threw the shaft 151-7 1/2 for a meet record. Miss Hamilton of the Louisiana Track Club missed on her first two tosses when she javelin failed to stick. Miss Gerrish then gave Miss Hamilton her javelin and the Louisiana girl used it to make her winning throw.

Ken Simmons, one of the girls' coaches, said that the two girls' performances were remarkable. He said he felt sure the girls will be making future Pan-American and Olympic teams. The Olympic team he is thinking about is the 1968 squad.

Miss Kraker was trailing Gloria Hopper of Compton, Calif., by two yards when she kicked in for the final 100 yards. She broke the tape one-half second ahead of the California girl.

"That's her best time ever and no other girl of her age in the nation has ever run the 880 faster," said Simmons. Miss Kraker will not compete in the women's events.

Meanwhile, Uncle Sam finds out tonight the speed and strength of his women's team.

Finals of the National AAU championships at the Hanford High School track decides the makeup of the team. Generally, the first two finishers in each event wins a spot but the AAU reserves the right to make final decisions.

Judging from the girls' championships which ended Friday night with two American and four meet standards bettered, there has been improvement among the distaff athletes.

And you can bet some of the 14-17 girls' group will hold their own against the seniors. Foremost might be 17-year-old Lynda Bradshaw of Oakland, Calif., who won her sprint battle against Maryland's Debbie Thompson at both 75 and 50 yards. Their

times were identical at 8.4 and 6.0 seconds, but Lynda was a foot ahead in each.

In the trials, Miss Thompson of Frederick, Md., set an American girls' mark and meet record of 8.1 for 75 yards.

The teen-age star could also be 16-year-old Shirley Wilson, who paced her Compton, Calif., team to the girls' championship winning the 220 in 24.5 and the 440 in 58.5, a meet record.

Tammy Davis of Frederick

smashed her American and meet girls' record for the 50-yard hurdles by one-tenth second at 6.6.

Nancy Norberg of Palo Alto, Calif., repeated as discus champion with a meet record toss of 142-3 1/2.

The pair of Ann Arbor thinclads took part in the Ohio U.S. Federation Track and Field Championship meet last night with Westfield placing second in the 330-yard intermediate hurdles and fourth in the high hurdles and Steffes winning the triple jump.

Westfield placed second to Bill Washington of the Cleveland Striders in a hotly contested race. Washington was clocked in :37.4 and Westfield in :37.5 in the intermediate hurdles. Both men bettered the Bowling Green University track record (:37.7) and they also beat Ohio State's Bill Smith, Big Ten champion and record holder, who placed third in 38.3. Washington also won the highs in 14.7 and Westfield's time was 14.9.

Steffes, who only got three jumps, won the triple jump with a 43 feet, 10 inch effort.
