## Four Journal Relays Times Equal to Big Ten Prep Trackmen Sparkle

A quartet of Michigan high school boys proved Saturday night that they don't have to take a back seat to the collegians.

Two athletes from Mt. Clemens and one apiece from Battle Creek and Kalamazoo turned in performances at the State Journal-Spartan Relays at Jenson Fieldhouse that would have placed in this year's Big Ten indoor meet.

Just as was the case in the Class B meet Friday night, records fell with alacrity as Class A athletes topped seven marks including college class performances by Arnie Williams of Battle Creek, Fred Carver of Kalamazoo Central and Dick Robinson and Andrew Pegues of Mt. Clemens.

The battle for the team championship went right down to the final event with Roseville and Ypsilanti ending up in a tie for first with 17 points apiece. Birmingham School was third with 15 points. Everett was the top Greater Lansing finisher, scor-

ing 10 points while Sexton had eight and one-half. East Lansing finished with five.

A pacing crowd of 2,274 saw Williams post the best mark, clocking :06.2 in a heat of the 60-yard dash to easily smash the old meet record of :06.4. The heat's speedster who was the class A state sprint champion last year won semifinal and final races in :06.3. His :06.2 clocking was equal to the winning time in the Big Ten indoor meet.

Carver, a Manistowick junior, cleared six-foot-five-inches in the high jump, an inch over the meet record set

last year, but won the event only on the fewer misses rule. Pegues also jumped 6.5 in second place and Fred Bolle of East Detroit cleared 6.4 in third place. The two 6.5 efforts were equal to fourth place in the Big Ten meet.

Finally, Robinson ran a fast

:08.0 in the 70-yard low hurdles to erase the old mark of :08.2 set last year by Everett's Henry Patton and equalled by Robinson earlier in the day. Robinson's :08.0 was as good as the fourth place performance turned in by Michigan State's Clinton

Jones in the Big Ten meet.

Besides the above marks, meet records also fell in the shot put, 880-yard relay, mile relay, two-mile relay, and sprint medley relay.

Charley Davis of Sexton turned in the top greater Lansing performance by winning the 70-yard high hurdles in :08.8, two-tenths above the meet record. Davis picked up two more points with a fourth place in the low hurdles.

East Lansing had one of the top performances in the afternoon session but didn't win. The Trojan quartet of Mike Bellair, Rick Knoblock, Steve Miller and Ashbey Mullings easily broke the meet record



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of 8:14.8 in the two-mile relay but had to settle for second as Roseville won in 8:08.8. Miller had a 2:00.0 clocking on the third leg and Mullings 2:09.5 in anchoring.

Jack Sulpher had the best showing for Everett, placing second in the mile after leading just about all the way. Tom Kearney of Bloomfield Hills swept past Sulpher on the last lap to win in 4:29.0 while Sulpher finished in 4:33.2, his personal best.
