When Twin Double Is Double Trouble

"WANNA SELL?" ASKED the stocky gent in dark glasses and a checkered coat. "I'll give you a C for it . . ."

"The man in the turker line blinked a couple of times. "You mean a hundred bucks?" he countered.

"In cash," came the answer. "Right now."

The deal was closed. Mr. Checkered Coat pocketed the live twin double ticket and ambled over to a little guy in a sports shirt who was deep inside a Racing Form.

"Got a live one going?" he queried. A nod was his answer. "Give you a hundred for it," he said.

The little guy shook his head. "How about one five?" said Mr. C.C. "You got it," said the little guy. "It was a deal, one of many made by day at Hazel Park and by night at Wolverine. They are more common than rare. They also are illegal.

Selling are better who by luck or science slabbeth winners in the first half of the twin. That would be the fifth and sixth races. To complete the double-double they must win two more in the eighth and ninth.

It is no small job. Mr. C.C. and compatriots, make it easier for the two-back better who is halfway home on the lucrative twin. They buy it from him, give him a heavy profit, relieve him of his worries and the risk of losing the whole deal.

They then either re-sell the live ticket . . . at a profit . . . to somebody else or utilize it themselves in a combine aimed only at cashing in on the lucrative twin.

State Violates State Law

THE COMBINE ALREADY MAY have a half-dozen live tickets in its hands. It is willing and able to spend big money to pick up five or six more live ones so it can get a better crack at banking the field, or wheeling in the payoff half of the twin.

The average weekday payoff at Hazel is around \$10,000, about half that at Wolverine. It is divided among holders of winning tickets, be it one or a couple hundred.

Officials at both tracks admit live tickets are being sold in violation of a state racing rule which specifically makes such transactions illegal.

Richard Connell (Hazel) and Orison Owen (Wolverine) insist the rule is unenforceable. Each says it is practically a physical impossibility to police every spot at the track where such a sale could be proposed, or completed.

"We have warned a few guys," Connell stated. "They are hard to catch," added Owen. "And there aren't many of them anyway."

That could be. But ever since the controversial twin was introduced last season at the Detroit Race Course, there has been open traffic and exchange of money between men like Mr. Checkered Coat who buy live tickets for combine purposes.

The practice is common in other states too. Last spring at Hialeah, agents were paying \$5,000 for a live ticket after a pair of outlandish longshots had come in to win the fifth and sixth races to set up a whopping twin payoff with only a few tickets going on it.

All states have the same rule, that the sale of twin double tickets by one person to another, except through
