

Kalamazoo Central Grabs State Class A Track Title

East Lansing—Strength in the field events handed Kalamazoo Central its third state C track and field championship, first since 1942, before 4,000 sunbathed fans Saturday afternoon on the Michigan State University track.

Kalamazoo finished with a total of 45 points, one of the highest totals in years, while Flint Central took second with 34, followed by Detroit Northwestern with 31.

A young Ypsilanti club surprised the field by placing fourth with 29 tallies, followed by Roseville with 27, Battle Creek Central, defending champion, ended up sixth with 24.

Mt. Clemens and Detroit Eastern tied with 17 each and Pontiac Central had 15.

Grand Rapids Catholic Central ended a point famine by Furniture City teams in the state meet over the last three years by scoring two points when Bob Godleski placed seventh in the long jump with a 21-9/4 leap.

Catholic finished fifteenth in the team standings. Remainder of West Michigan class A teams in the 80-plus field failed to dent the point column.

Kalamazoo won the state class A championship in 1933 and 1942. The squad won the '65 classic without the aid of a top sprinter or hurdler, considered "musts" strength for any title team.

Kalamazoo displayed its power in the field events with 21 points. The Maroon Gallants, coached by Elf Pender, tallied eight points each in the shotput

and the long jump. Seven more added in the high jump and one in the pole vault. Kalamazoo's mile relay team added eight big points by placing third in the last event on the program to steal the victory away from Flint Central and Detroit Northwestern.

The state kings added six points in the mile and seven in the 440-yard dash.

Kalamazoo won the title with only two firsts.

Six Carver, 6-2 junior, all Fred A. Conference basketball player, was the big scoring gun for the Celery City squad. He took first in the long jump with a 22-5 leap and was second in the high jump. He actually tied Detroit Eastern's Stan Allen in the high jump, but the Detroit youth had fewer attempts (9-14). The winning height was 6-5 1/2. Only one new standard went into the record books. Another one of long standing was tied.

Detroit Southeastern's mile relay unit of John Suddler, Larry Stanfield, Obrá Punnell and Ralphe Thomas was clocked in 3:22.6, breaking the old mark of 3:24.5 by Detroit MacKenzie and Flint Northern in 1963.

Bucks Head Wind

The 100-yard dash of 9.8 was tied by Battle Creek's Arnold Williams. The Battle Creek senior, headed for Garden City, Kan. Junior College next fall as one of the finest sprinters turned out in Michigan in years, ran the century in 9.8 in the Saturday morning prelims and again in the Saturday afternoon finals.

He was bucking a strong headwind both times. Officials approved the standard.

The old century mark was held by George Hefter, Detroit Northern (1925); Ed Tolan, Detroit Cass Tech (1927); Seibert Dent, Alpena (1925); and Flint Northern's Wilbur Johnson (1903).

Williams also finished second in the 220 yard and was a member of the 880 yard relay team which finished second.

He totaled 17 1/4 points for high scoring honors.

Last year Williams won both dashes in the state meet in Ann Arbor.

Flint Central's Len Hatchett was the meet's only double winner. He took the high hurdles in 14.4 and the 180-yard lows in 10.3 seconds.

Locals Fall to Move

Brian Moore, outstanding Cass Tech miler, won the applause of the crowd with his stretch kick to edge Bloomfield Hills' Tom Kearney in 4:13.4; two tenths of a second from the state record.

Grandville's Tim Scheerhorn just missed breaking into the point column.

The bespectacled pole vaulter cleared 12-6 to finish ninth, one position out of the scoring column.

He lost his bid with three misses.

Grand Rapids' hurdlers and sprinters failed to move out of the Saturday morning preliminaries. Central Christian's Sid Holwerda just missed in both hurdles.

Grand Rapids' top high jumper, Ottawa's Bill Goodson, failed to compete in the state meet for the second straight year. He failed to report at the school when the team departed for East Lansing, along with sprinter Virilee Trice, according to a member of the Ottawa Hills coaching staff.

Indiana Toppled By Wolverines

BLOOMINGTON, Ind. (AP)—Michigan wrestled the Big Ten tennis championship from Indiana Saturday by winning six of the nine titles at stake.

The Wolverine netters pulled away from the defending champions in the team scoring, 142 to 127.

Clark Gebner, Northwestern's champion in the No. 2 singles last year, advanced to the No. 1 singles crown with a 3-6, 6-4, 6-3 conquest of Indiana's Dave Powers.

The No. 1 doubles title went to Powers and his Hoosier teammate, Rod McNeerney, who defeated Karl Hedrick and Jerry Stewart of Michigan, 6-3, 6-3.

Other team scores: Northwestern 84, Michigan State 82, Illinois 62, Minnesota 41, Iowa 32, Wisconsin 31, Ohio State 30, Purdue, 21 1/2.

CMU Shares Track Title

NORMAL, Ill. (AP)—Central Michigan and Northern Illinois each scored 63 points Saturday to share the first title honors ever recorded in an Interstate Intercollegiate Athletic Conference track meet.

Eastern Illinois was third with 49, followed by Western Illinois 46, and Illinois State 23.

Reds Blast Phils, 9-4

CINCINNATI (AP)—Tony Perez hit a three-run homer and two singles and Vada Pinson slammed a bases-empty homer, leading the Cincinnati Reds to a 9-4 victory over Philadelphia Saturday night.

Perez hit his homer in the first inning as the Reds hopped on Bill Bellamy for five runs. Pinson triggered a three-run third with a leadoff homer before Don Pavletich drove in two more with a double.

Bellamy had difficulty with wildness in the first inning, forcing in a run by walking Frank Robinson with the bases loaded. Robinson Johnson's sacrifice fly produced another run before Perez hit his third homer of the season.

Joe Nuxhall got the victory with Gerry Arrigo's relief help. Nuxhall was thrown out of the game in the seventh inning by Umpire Chris Pelekoudas for bench jockeying.

Johnny Callison hit his seventh homer for the Phillies.

A's Pound Four Twin Pitchers

ST. PAUL-MINNEAPOLIS (AP)—Fred Talbot and John Wyatt combined to tame Minnesota while Kansas City pounded four Twins' pitchers for a 6-2 victory Saturday.

Talbot fired his fastball past the Twins for seven strikeouts the first four innings but ran into trouble in the eighth when Minnesota bunched three hits for a run.

Wyatt relieved Talbot and yielded a run-scoring single to Jimmie Hall before getting Rich Rollins to tap into an inning-ending double play. Hall was shaken up trying to break up the twin-killing and left the game.

Rookie catcher Rene Lachemann drove in two Kansas City runs with a sacrifice fly and singled, while Ken Harrelson stroked three hits, including a double and triple, and scored twice.

The Athletics benefitted from two misplays by Twins' starter Jim Kaat for two of their runs. Jim Kaat wild-pitched a run home in the first, and his wild throw to third on a pickoff attempt in the fourth let in another run.


