

Kutschinski of East Sets 'B' 880 Mark

ANN ARBOR (AP)—Ron Kutschinski, East Grand Rapids senior, led a mass assault on state Class B track records Saturday when he ran the half mile in 1:53.8 at the University of Michigan's Ferry Field.

Kutschinski's time broke the old standard of 1:56.1, set by Mike Martins of Charlotte in 1962. However, the new mark is two-tenths of a second slower than Kutschinski's Grand Valley Conference mark, set last season.

A 6-foot-7 high jumper, Jim Miller of Sturgis, cleared the bar at 6 feet 5 inches and broke the old state record of 6-2½, set in 1960 by Jerry Holmes of Ecorse.

River Rouge dominated the entire afternoon and captured the Class B title.

The Panthers won both relays, had two individual championships and earned 61 points, far more than their nearest competition.

Willow Run placed second with 26 points, two more than Ecorse. Albion and Vassar tied for fourth with 21 points each.

Three records were shattered in the meet.

Jim Miller of Sturgis cleared the bar at 6-feet-5 to eclipse the old high jump record of 6-2½ set in 1960 by Jerry Holmes of Ecorse.

Bob Johnson of Vassar broke his own year-old record to win the shot put with a heave of 58-5½.

East Grand Rapids senior Ron Kutschinski sped to a new half mile mark, winning the event in 1:53.8. His time bettered the old record of 1:56.1 set by Mike

Martins of Charlotte in 1962.

Rouge's foursome of Chester and Will Wright, Eugene Wilson and Clarence Sabbath won the 880-yard relay ahead of two Twin Valley League rivals, Ecorse and Willow Run. They were clocked in 1:32.1.

In the mile relay, the quartet of Allen Walker, George Miles,

Ron Lane and Eric Peterson beat Dearborn Riverside to win for River Rouge in 3:28.6.



Sabbath also won the 100-yard dash, running :10.5 into a stiff wind.

River Rouge's other individual champion was Peterson, who was clocked in :50.2 in the 400-yard dash.

Albion's Pat Howard won the broad jump title with a leap of 21-7¼. Steve Bishop of Vicksburg led most of the way to win the mile run in 4:22.8.

The pole vault sent the meet into overtime when 17 entrants cleared the bar at 12 feet.

The meet, for the first time, was scored through eight places for all events except the relays, in which points were awarded through ten places.

Ohio State Wins Title In Baseball

Slaps Spartans In Double Bill, 13-10 and 2-0
