

Travel Plans Disrupted

POPLAR BLUFF, Mo. — The airline strike threw a monkey wrench into the travel plans of Ann Arbor's Francie Kraker but that did not prevent her from winging her way to a national record.

Miss Kraker had to make new air travel arrangements to reach California to participate in the United States-Poland track meet this weekend in Berkeley. The following weekend, she is slated for competition in the United States-Russia meet in Los Angeles.

Miss Kraker did some flying of her own in the 880-yard run in the National AAU

Junior Women's Track Meet here Saturday.

She won the event with a clocking of 2:11.7 which broke the record she had set in the

qualifications the day before. She also placed second in the 1500-yard run.

This performance won for her the designation, "The

Most Outstanding Athlete" in the meet.
