## 2 Records Spoiled By Wind

MANSFIELD, O. — Is Bill Tipton America's foremost schoolboy hurdler?

The 152-pound Pontiac Central star earned a host of converts here Saturday in the 36th Mansfield Relays.

Record efforts in both the 120-yard high and 180-yard low were disallowed when wind gusts up to 20 miles an hour swept out of the west on an otherwise perfect day for track.

Tipton was clocked in 13.3 seconds in the high, twentith of a second better than the national high school record set two years ago by Richmond Flowers.

HE CAME back late in the afternoon to win the low in 18.3, seven-tenths of a second better than the record, but this also was disallowed because of the wind.

Tipton was one of two double winners to thrill the capacity crowd of 6,000 who came here to watch the nation's premiere track and field presentation.

Larry Highbaugh of Indianapolis Washington flashed to wind-assisted marks of 68.2 in the 100-yard dash and 29.4 in the 230 to become the day's other double winner.

Highbaugh upset favored Jimmy Green of Eminence, Ky., in both dashes.

Michigan, one of six states competing in the field of 2,174 athletes, took home five first places.

IN ADDITION to Tipton's double, other Michigan winners were Guillo Castallo of East Detroit in the shot put, Ron Strang of Detroit Lutheran West in the mile and Ann Arbor's medley relay team.

Castallo threw the shot 61 feet 1 1/2 inches. It was seven inches off the record here. But his effort was 1 1/2 feet better than the Michigan Class A record of 60 feet 4 1/4 inches held by Bradell Pritchett.

Strang was a big surprise. Despite his victory in the Spartan Relays two weeks ago, Strang was the underdog to Wes Brock, the Ohio champion from Toledo. Brock had done 4:15.3 before.

But Strang overtook him in the final 70 yards to win handily in 4:23.1.

The medley relay was an all-Michigan finish with Ann Arbor winning in 7:20.3 followed by Epilanti and Birmingham Seaborn. Ann Arbor got its decisive victory from a quartet of Pat Doran, Fred Smith, Pat Shipstead and Brent Stone.

Pontiac Central finished fifth in the team event with 13 points. The title went to Indianapolis Washington with 24 points, followed by Warren (O.) Harding with 20, Cleveland Glenville 15, Eminence, 14 and Pontiac.
