five teams in the standings with Ecorse finally capturing the coveted team trophy for the second straight year.

Tickets at Gate

The meet started this afternoon with finals in three events with the remaining 10 finals slated for tonight.

The first running event tonight will be the 78-yard high hurdle final at 6:30 p.m.

Tickets are \$2 for adults and \$1 for students.

The Wildcats from Oxford looked like they had the title wrapped up in the afternoon but two misfortunes in the evening ruined their title chances. In the 880 relay, Oxford was running third in the fast final heat when the Wildcat anchor man inexplicably fell about 20 yards from the finish to drop the team out of a scoring place.

In the shuttle hurdles relay. the Wildcats had the lead on the last leg but their anchorman clobbered two hurdes and Charlotte swept by to capture the title. Oxford wound up fourth in the event to lose three points, which would have been

enough for victory.

Wayne Hartwick, who won both the high and low hurdles.


